
The DMI's 8th International Conference

A wonderful 75th birthday mid March

We are certainly living in difficult times. I am at the hospital as I write waiting first to see the oncologist then going across the road for another bag of bright blue chemo medicine. My cheeky nurse told me I would turn blue so was disappointed last time that it did not happen. I still have the needle in me from the morning's test so don't have to endure another jab.

We are now in stage 3 restrictions so all people like me, old and with a compromised immune system, have to be extra careful. It is a bit of a drag but we have so much to be thankful for. We can still go to the supermarket or at least get someone

to go for us. There is food enough and even toilet paper!!

For me to be tied down is a bit frustrating so I am enjoying the outing to the hospital even if it is to have chemo administered.

Entering into this time of uncertainty with people losing their jobs, and others not knowing what is going to happen, makes it so difficult for us to plan our work and support what is going on. Our schools are all closed except for the one in Myanmar. Some, particularly in the Philippines, are confined to their homes and are unable to go out to the point they can't buy food as there is no transport available. We are very fortunate.

Thank you for your continued support of our work even when you are in difficult straights yourself. We do so much appreciate your kindness and love. Please continue to pray for the work, the deaf whom we are involved with, that their needs will be met during this confusing time.
