Josephat is head of DMI Kenya and has sent us an update on the situation there:

"As COVID-19 continues to spread, the future has never felt so unpredictable. These are challenging times for us all, and we hope you're in good spirits and health! Right now, we're struggling to keep our DMI-Kenya Ministry alive with all the challenges we are currently facing.

Banning of social gatherings by the Government has forced us to instruct our believers to stay at home and follow church service online. Unfortunately, the majority of the Deaf in Kenya can't access the online sermon because they are unable to access the internet. So, only a few are lucky to follow the online sermon. Covid-19 is both a health and economic emergency which has negatively affected DMI Kenya Board members, workers, Church members and their families. Some have lost their source of income since the Government announced some measures such as staying at home, prohibiting social gatherings, partial curfew and restrictions of movement from one county to another. Most of the Deaf here in Kenya are very vulnerable. This pandemic has resulted into a crisis within the families since most of them are now unable to pay their house rents and feed their families. The situation is getting worse as some house owners/landlords threaten to evict the Deaf tenants. Even the Deaf are forced to change their daily meal plan by taking one or

two meals a day. Sometimes others have to sleep hungry due to failure to get foods.

The government has failed to provide relief foods to the vulnerable Deaf community."

due to COVID-19 and was unable to return to Tanzania and his family at this time.



The floods did not impact the Beni community.
