## MYANMAR



The family of Mrs Zung Hlawn Tial, the Principal of Muir School in Kalay has joyfully welcomed the arrival of a baby girl, named Ruth meaning "most precious love". The students will be very pleased to meet her when they return to school but parts of Kalay are in lock-down now and the school has been closed until the pandemic improves again

in Kalay.

The covid pandemic is worse in Yangon and has spread to many areas of the city. Food costs have increased making it hard for our deaf community there. Food gifts of rice and oil were distributed a

few months ago and 30 families have been helped again in October.

## KENYA and UGANDA

The cost of food is still a big problem for our deaf people in Kenya and Uganda. Thank you Sponsors and Supporters for continuing to send sponsorship donations, and extra donations for food. The schools in Kenya and Uganda are not permitted to open yet so sponsorship payments are being used to provide food for the deaf families who cannot afford to buy it while food costs are so high. This is keeping the teachers busy too. Our leaders are buying food in bulk and packing it into food parcels then delivering it to families in their villages. Maize meal, rice, beans, cooking oil, cabbage, cassava, bananas, paw paws, and any other crops grown on the school farm are providing good nutrition for them.



## THE D.R. CONGO – BENI School for the Deaf

This school opened again on October the 5th after their school holidays. THANK YOU Australia and Norway for donations to build the kitchen and purchase cooking and eating utensils. The kitchen is built; and the pots, plates and utensils have been purchased. So the students can now enjoy a hot healthy lunch cooked inside. You have made these children very happy. Money has been allocated for lunch up to February; but we have a bigger vision for them.



**New Farm Project:** The next good idea from the Principal at Beni is to start a 'food garden' on the school land so that the students could learn how to grow their own food. It is also a wonderful opportunity to start vocational training in farming for the older teenagers, as well as learning the basic subjects! We are amazed how the vision of our hearing impaired School Principal is changing the future for these deaf students!

There is also a farm next to the school compound that is available to buy. It already has crops growing! The school is happy to start the school garden first; so if you would like to donate to the **Beni School Farm Project** please mark you donations "Beni Farm". This will make a huge difference to their nutrition and teach the older students how to grow their own food.

## RWANDA and ZAMBIA - THANK YOU SPONSORS

**Alphonsine UWIMANA in Rwanda** is studying Year 3 in Business Management at the University of Tourism, Technology and Business Studies, in Kigale, Rwanda. Alphonsine also manages the accounts for our DMI office in Rwanda and shares a rented house with her sister who is also deaf.

Hastings gained the highest results in his Junior Secondary exam and has been promoted to Grade 10. Maliza really enjoys going to school where he receives special help and has friends.



## BACOLOD DORMITORY - PHILIPPINES

The children returned to the Bacolod Dormitory in July and re-enrolled at the Special Education Center for the 20/21 school year. The teachers prepare and print work modules for the students, but the students are not attending the school. They complete their work modules in the dormitory and their work is corrected by the teachers at school. The children also enjoy games, computer learning and play time with their deaf friends at the dormitory. They must follow the coronavirus guidelines and wear masks if they go out.





## F.C.L.C. - LIGAO - PHILIPPINES

Some areas of the Philippines have been devastated by 5 typhoons recently and they often hit the area of our school! The wind and heavy rain has destroyed and damaged buildings, roads and telecommunications. Some of our teachers' and students' homes were destroyed, flooded or damaged. The rain and floods have destroyed plantations and rice fields.



Most of the school buildings were not badly damaged this time, but the roof of the guard house at the school was blown off and dumped in a rice field! Damage to our school buildings is less now because after each typhoon the school buildings are rebuilt to a higher standard. But the trees, farm crops and plants are usually blown down or washed away!

The school was without electricity for weeks and this made it very difficult for the teachers to print the work modules for the students to complete at home. Some of the high school students and those who live a long way from the school are learning online.

Once again our graduating students have excelled and gained very high results in their final exams! Cyrene Aria, Jiselle Jash and John Carl will continue their study at Colleges of their choice. Mary Hazel also gained very high results. She has already been running her own business from home, but sadly her parents' home, including her established home business, was washed away by high tides due to the typhoon! Life is hard for our deaf families.

I send my best wishes for a **HAPPY CHRISTMAS** to you and your family.
