#### Myanmar

Our DMI family in Myanmar have been very brave. The situation remains volatile and highly dangerous. The banking system is still problematic and we are trying to work our way around that. But there are bigger concerns at the moment. Pa-Lian recently sent us footage of an intense gunfire exchange between government and rebel forces just a block from our school in Kalay. He reports that, "On the day of the shooting, our principal was coming back from a deaf student's house to her own house at around 2:00pm. The shooting stated an hour later." Despite these present dangers, our teachers continue to go three days a week to the children's houses to teach. They are so devoted to their students.



In Yangon where our church is, there is shooting every night though it is safer in the day. The members of our

congregation are all safe. None have been detained but some older members have died from COVID.

## **Uganda - Neville Muir Comprehensive School**

300 students have registered to study in 2022 at the Neville Muir Comprehensive School, run by our indefatigable Director Dennis Dag-kane! (See https://deafministriesinternational.com/25-dennis/) The school re-opened on 1st November with 80 year 1 and year 2 students. Current course studies are Brick Laying and Concrete Practice (BCP), Hair Dressing (HD) and Tailoring and Cutting Garments (TCG) & Knitting, as well as Sign Language and English studies. There are 8 teachers at the school now but this will grow to 16 once the school is back in full swing.

The school is looking to increase its courses on offer to include Computer Literacy, Motor Vehicle Technology, Electrical Installation, Welding and Metal Fabrication, Painting and Decoration, Agriculture, and Formal Technical Education. Dennis is active in leading church services and evangelical work. Daily morning devotions have resumed on the grounds with a fellowship time every evening. Every Friday afternoon there is a special fellowship event for all students and staff, and every Sunday a church service is held for all at Pa-Lian writes, "Last night about 20 police and soldiers with guns came to my home about 12 midnight to check if we had any guests. This is normal now - for Kalay too. But we have no problem because we had no guests. They often check our phones to see if there is anything on them so we always 'clean' them after using them. We are thankful to DMI for the full support we receive so we do not starve. Everything is going



well with us. And good news! This Sunday we will have the Lord's supper at church! One of our church friends - the Manassa family who were in our church in Yangon every Sunday and are now back in the USA - donated rice and oil so we will share it all. This Sunday our church members will be very happy. For Christmas day, we have received another donation from DMI's deaf pastor Rev. Heo In Yeong in Korea and we will share rice and oil again."

Let's give thanks and continue to pray for the safety and freedom of our congregants and students in Myanmar.

#### Tanzania - a testimony

#### **Glory: From Islam to Christ**



My name is Glory. I am the third child in an Islamic family of five. Like other Muslim children, I studied the Quran and followed its teachings. But something was missing. As a child, I had many unanswered questions about Allah.

"Why did we have to pray five times a day? Why did we have to cover ourselves? Why did we have to speak to God in Arabic? Could God not understand our native language, which is Swahili?"

I always felt "disappointed" when I read the Quran and never felt a closeness to God by reading it. My father often hitting my mother, saying that Islamic allowed him to punish an unruly wife, led me to hate my religion. When I was in 7th

grade, my parents divorced and my mother later died a heart -broken woman.

Poverty followed. Living on my own, I became desperate. I started a relationship with a hearing man while still at school so that I could rely on him on for daily necessities, and through this relationship I became pregnant which led me to abandon my studies. I gave birth to a son and started life with this man who was also from a Muslim family.

However, he would get drunk every night after coming home and beat me. All of this reminded me of my parents' life and my mother's sad death. He left me for another woman, took my son and left me on my own. I was broken losing my son and my health deteriorated.

I found a part-time job in a hair salon where I met another deaf sister named Juliana. She was an evangelist and choir member at the Immanuel Church of the Deaf. She was always singing praises to God and shared with me the good news of Jesus' salvation. I also learned about this new faith from Jestina\* who answered difficult questions for me and directed me to church leaders who could help.

I told my sister about this Good News but she chased me from her home after being advised by Muslim sheikhs. Juliana and the church leaders helped me to find another place to live. Their love touched me so much. I was able to access the Bible and memorised verses that carried me through some awful times. It wasn't easy. But there is a verse in Matthew that talks about forgiving your enemies and those who persecute you. I asked God to help me to live those verses. Having accepted Jesus as my Saviour, I attended weekly baptism classes, and was baptised on May 23, 2020. Now, I follow Jesus and listen to Him and see Him making a real difference in my life, an urge to live I never had before. I still need support spiritually and physically. God has given me back my son but without a full-time job I can't educate my son. Please pray for me, that I will get a permanent job or a sponsor for my son's education.
