

Bible Schools for the Deaf Grand Vision

One of our most wonderful and important visions is to develop Bible schools for the Deaf on three continents. We currently have a Bible school in Uganda to train pastors and evangelists from all over Africa. We are also developing a four month Bible school in Norway to serve Europe, but it will even provide scholarships to students from the Middle East and from African countries. And we plan to develop a new Bible school in the Philippines to train the Deaf in ministry from all over Asia.

The work of our Bible schools is truly revolutionary. Training the Deaf to take the gospel to the Deaf is a surprisingly unique approach, yet is so important to effectively reach out to the Deaf and into Deaf cultures and communities. The benefits of running Bible schools on three continents will be almost incalculable to the Deaf all around the world.

Our Bible school in Uganda has been running for 18 years and typi-

cally trains 10~12 students every year. Students study for 3 years and stay at the dormitory attached to the school. Once graduated, our students go on to serve as pastors and evangelists to the Deaf in their own local communities, or go as missionaries to other regions or countries in Africa. Graduates include David Bulime who went on to become the Mission Co-ordinator with Deaf Action Uganda, Papy Muteberwa who is now in charge of the Church of the Deaf in Congo and is the Executive Director Deaf Action Congo, Ruth Karuki who serves in the Immanuel Church of the Deaf in Nairobi, Dennis Dag-Kene who works as Director of Neville Muir School for Children with Special needs in Lira, Ben Buyinza who is a Serving Missionary in Tanzania, Claire Uwineza who is the Leader of Immanuel Church of the Deaf in Rwanda, and many more. So many Deaf are being reached through our graduates. *Continued...*



NEWS FLASH!

Just on going to print, we received donations from some very generous supporters to enable us to buy an excellent plot of land on which we can re-develop the Bible school in Uganda. This is wonderful news! This land (and the building we build there) will enable us to train Deaf Christian leaders for generations to come. The impact this will have on the Deaf in Africa is hard to overestimate. Praise God for this wonderful development!

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Running the school is not cheap though. Current monthly funding for the Bible school in Uganda is:

- USD440 for the school (food and school materials)
- USD350 to pay for school principal's wages
- USD600 to pay teachers' wages

This is not enough for our current operations. We need another USD150 per month.

This is just for daily operations. Beyond that, there is a need to redevelop our school in Uganda, to foster our school in Norway, and to build from scratch our school in the Philippines. These costs will be considerable yet we are convinced that this vision is good and right and worth pursuing. We pray for provision to see this vision come to fruition!

New Leadership - Uganda

A wonderful new era began in Uganda in March when the DAU (Deaf Action Uganda) Board elected Tonny Eyoku to be the new DAU Director and Paul Miiro to be the new head of the Bible School. Josephat Mulongo, head of Deaf Action Kenya, had been Interim Director of DAU and his wise leadership over the last few years and through the current changes was invaluable. We're grateful to have such wise leadership at the helm. Even so, change can bring anxiety so Gunnar, our International Advisor, went to Uganda to oversee the transition. Together, with all the DAU Board and staff, a unified transition was achieved. Tonny and Paul were prayed over and a fresh start for DAU was celebrated. We pray and look forward to DAU going from strength to strength.

Encouraging growth among the Deaf in Africa

The pandemic has not hindered growth in the ministries among the Deaf in Africa. This became evident for me when I again visited Uganda and Rwanda in March and April. I found new leaders ready to carry on the responsibilities for the Bible school and the national ministry in Uganda. When I visited the vocational school in Lira (Uganda) I found that Dennis again is gathering nearly 300 young students there. It was wonderful to see how the Deaf and the hearing students were fellowshipping together.

In Rwanda I met several leaders

who were ready to take on more responsibilities in the churches for the deaf. Together with Josephat from Kenya we did a workshop on church leadership. We then ordained four new Deaf pastors, a

After the ordination in Rwanda, we headed off, five hours in a bus, to stay at a school for the Deaf in the north of Rwanda. There we were 35 people gathered, mostly young adults, for six days, to do a Fatherheart program together. It was wonderful to see how the participants experienced Father's love. Many went also

Thank you, Daniel - Tanzania

One of our most exciting fields is Tanzania. Tanzania is surely the great quiet achiever of DMI. Just in the last two quarters they have held for the Deaf leadership training seminars, marriage seminars, Bible studies, baptisms, scripture classes in schools, loan management training and bought a farm! It's been truly inspiring to follow the wonderful work our pastors and evangelists have been doing across the country.

But these developments haven't just suddenly hap-

pened. They are largely the result of one man's faithful toil for the Lord. Daniel Njihia, a Ugandan native, was tapped by Neville 23 years ago to take the gospel to the Deaf in Tanzania. (Anyone who was ever 'tapped' by Neville for service would know where that leads...!) And take the gospel he did! In Tanzania we now have many pastors and evangelists serving thousands of members across 6 parishes.

Daniel has now semi-retired to Uganda where he continues to serve with DMI on a part-time basis. We are so grateful for Daniel's wonderful service. The Deaf of Tanzania, now led by Joseph Hiza and others formerly under Daniel's leadership, share our thanks and are enjoying new life because of Daniel's apostleship there.

Joseph writes about Daniel's legacy here:

You cannot talk about the development of Deaf ministries in Tanzania and all of East Africa without naming Rev. Daniel Nhijia. He has spent nearly two-thirds of his life in Deaf ministries, primarily in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania and beyond.

In December 1999, Neville sent Rev Daniel to Tanzania; it was the official start of Daniel's 22-year ministry journey in Tanzania. During

The Immanuel Church of the Deaf Tanzania was registered on November 14, 2002. Deaf Action Tanzania was registered in 2017.

Lake District - Tanzania

Ben Buyinza is a pastor from Uganda who has been serving under DMI in the Tanzanian Lake District with his Tanzanian wife, Veronica. Neville sent him to Tanzania as a missionary in 2012. Ben has done a wonderful job witnessing to Deaf communities and helping to expand DMI's reach in different districts. In May, he will become



a Tanzanian citizen which will mean he will no longer need to apply and pay for work permits. Recently, funds were raised to purchase him a he could reach all of the districts he ministers to.

Ben is passionate about reaching the Deaf for Christ and loves the opportunity to

- Six other churches were planted in Dar es Salaam, and the Mwanza, Kagera and Morogoro regions.
- Three new first local Deaf pastors were ordained: Joseph Hiza, Sensor Joseph and Alfred Maduga, not to mention the dozens of evangelists and spiritual leaders under his care.
- It was under his leadership that a Bible translation organization - the Tanzania Sign Language Translation Organization (known as BILAT) - was established after he sent some of his new evangelists to Door International in Nairobi in 2003.
- It was under his leadership and vision that the church purchased land and built a church at Buguruni opposite the Lutheran Church in 2005, which is today the church and DAT headquarters.
- This was also a start for mainstream churches in Tanzania to use sign language interpreters in their churches to attract deaf believers after they heard of Daniel's vision for the Deaf.
- Hundreds have received Christ and been baptized.

In his time, no other church in Tanzania officiated so many dozens of marriages for deaf couples, diminishing an immoral life that was witnessed among deaf Christians and couples prior to the ministry. His work also involved his family who joined him in the early 2000s. Besides his wife, his children Ruth, Joyce and Abrahamu stayed in Kenya but they visit him as often as he visited them.

Since he started working in Tanzania, he has truly been an inspiration to many and made them love God's work. He touched many of them and encouraged them. This is why almost all of the evangelists he taught and started with after returning to Tanzania for the second time in late 1999 are still working there in the ministry or with other religious organizations such as BILAT.

Everything depended on a solid foundation that he had put in place. His vision was wonderful, his way of reaching people, even those who seem reluctant, was brilliant. He knows who would be suitable for the ministry. He can reach someone by welcoming him to Christ, even if this person is hesitant, he will continue to follow him with divine words until this man comes to Jesus. The author of this article before his baptism was one of those hesitant people. Most of these hesitant people became powerful spiritual leaders and helped expand the ministry in the country.

Although the hearts of many Tanzanians are saddened by the news of his retirement as a missionary in Tanzania for family reasons, they are reassured by the word of God that whatever plan God has for him is wonderful. We always trust in the Lord.

Hello brothers and sisters,

I greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. My name is Ben Buyinza. I am here in Tanzania Lake zone, in charge of DMI work as a missionary. Thanks to DMI's support, the work has grown. We have 2 churches and 5 fellowships in schools. I travel to the 5 districts for outreach. The mission work is going well but some of the motorbike so that school fellowships cannot be accessed by bus, so we must use a motorbike for trips to make mission work easier. Through outreach trips, many deaf have accepted

> Jesus as their saviour. Because of DMI, the Deaf know Jesus Christ. Thank you and blessings.



Still No Peace For Myanmar

With the war that's broken out in the Ukraine and other conflicts continuing to rise around the world, it's easy to forget the ones that are ongoing. It's been just over a year since Myanmar came under military rule, turning the country into more like a war zone with people everyday living in fear of their lives - not to mention COVID hitting the country hard and many losing their lives to the unforgiving disease. Our Neville Muir School for the Deaf, like every other school in the country, was closed firstly because it wasn't safe for students to attend due to the violent political conflict, but then also due to the rapid spread of COVID. Some of our teachers fell ill with the disease and we praised God as they slowly recovered. We were saddened when we got the news that some of our elderly church members had passed away and prayed for comfort for their



Thanks to our generous supporters giving to the food emergency appeal, we eventually found a way to send the funds to the churches and the school to buy food for its members. What an opportunity this gave our workers to share the love of Jesus and be a light in such a dark time! We have an amazing bunch of teachers at the school who, despite all that is going on around them, are determined to keep supporting and educating students located in the area around the school. As you would have seen in photos from previous editions, the teachers have been Food aid dressing in PPE and teaching lessons in students' homes.

A year on and the situation is still very grim in Myanmar. People are still living in fear for their lives and there is much violence on the streets. It's amazing what becomes viewed as "normal". Pa Lian says in one of his emails "Yangong is like normal, but sometimes there is random bombing!"

Despite this, our teachers are continuing to go to the students homes and the students are always so happy when they arrive to teach them. They are meeting with 13 students 3 days a week. The church is still unable to meet formally but 12-15 have gathered together a few times a week to worship. They have been able to run a few zoom meetings for those who have access to the Internet, but many have no phones and no Wi-Fi. The church has been able to use funds from DMI to purchase food to distribute to those in most need. 65 Deaf have received packages of rice, noodles, oil, onions and eggs 6 times over the last 3 months. A van has also

been purchased which will be used for delivering the emergency food packages to those who are unable to come and pick them up.

It was hoped that the church would be able to celebrate it's 23rd Anniversary, but Pa Lian and his family got COVID,



so the church had to be closed until the 13th of March. As soon as he was back on his feet, the church wasted no time in getting food packages of rice and oil to 72 Deaf members.

Please continue to lift Myanmar up in your prayers.

Uganda Classroom Campaign

In some editions of our last newsletter we launched the Uganda Classroom Campaign. The campaign is to raise funds for the Neville Muir Comprehensive School for the Deaf to build 4 new classrooms to accommodate the large increase in student enrolments. The school now has more than 300 students with over 80 Deaf and 270 with other disabilities or special needs. Government regulations have meant that makeshift classrooms under trees are no longer adequate.

AUD60,000 was needed to be raised to complete this project and

with AUD45,000 already donated from generous sponsors in Norway, we are well on our way. Thank you to all of those who have already generously given towards this campaign. We need another AUS15,000 to finish the job! We pray that final amount can be raised so these students can not only continue their education, learning life-changing skills that give them a positive future, but learn these skills in a place where they are accepted, cared for, and taught that there is a God who loves them beyond measure.


Alain – DR Congo

WHY STUDENT SPONSORSHIP? - TESTIMONY MICHAEL AND ANNE HORTON



Deafness adds another layer of challenge to poverty and it is extra difficult for Deaf children to attract sponsors. We were already involved with the Deaf Community in Australia and can communicate in Auslan. We thought this understanding of visual communication could be helpful if we ever had the opportunity to meet a Deaf sponsor child, even if their sign language was different to ours. We already had a hearing sponsor child, Benjan (now an adult), in the Philippines, so we chose a Filipino Deaf sponsor child, Marcus, in the hope that one day we could see both of them in the same visit.

This dream came true in January, 2020. Benjan picked me up from the airport and drove me to meet Marcus. I recall this meeting being one of the most heart warming moments of my life. This photo that I took captures that moment.

Once you are a sponsor you know the profound truth of Jesus' words, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). We have felt this and seen it outworked on many levels, for example; Marcus had no sign language when his sponsorship and schooling started 2 years ago at 6 years of age, so both Marcus and I have been learning ASL. In a video call, Marcus was able to sign to me the exciting story of how he had lost a tooth. This spurred me on to more ASL learning (online). Learning ASL is bringing lots of joy, new friends and opportunities into my life, but the greatest joy is knowing I can communicate with Marcus in a way that's most comfortable and natural for him.

US Visit a Success! - Andrew Miller

I believe this relationship will prove to be a very fruitful one for DMI in the

coming years.

Peter and Liz Pfeil, DMI's leaders in the US, hosted me for my visit to the Hilton Head Presbyterian Church which has been generously supporting DMI for many years. It was a pleasure to meet with the large missions team there and share with them the wonderful work that DMI has been doing over the last couple of years in our churches, schools, employment projects and in humanitarian aid. Peter and Liz kindly let me stay in their house for three days even after they had left for Florida - that's when the backyard alligators began to give chase!

The last stop was at The Four Winds Church in Arkansas, another long-term generous supporter.
