



#### KENYA – IMMANUEL CHRISTIAN INTEGRATED SCHOOL

For the first time in more than two years, schools were allowed to hold graduations and parents' meet-

ings in the school. The Immanuel Christian Integrated School held its 12th graduation ceremony and for the first time in the history of the school, they held their first Integrated Graduation ceremony in the presence of Regional Education Officers including Reverend Vitalis Oduor who is also a Board Member of the school. The parents were very encouraged and delighted with their hearing children being allowed to study with children who are Deaf. They could not imagine their own hearing children being involved in everyday activities using sign language. From this celebration, the parents, along with the board members, advocated for a need for a Junior High School building for children transitioning from Primary School to Junior High School. Wesley is working with Pastor Gantt to make this happen. Watch this space!







#### **DR CONGO - BENI SCHOOL**



Our Beni School has started the construction of its secondary school following a generous donation left in a will. The secondary school is 40m away from the primary school and will consist of 11 rooms. They plan to finish the construction of the classrooms in June or July, and the office has already been completed. 25 students are ready to start at secondary school which will open from September, this year.

Students have been travelling to and from school safely. Rebels are still present but none of our students or staff at the school have been victims. The school garden is producing excellent crops of vegetables and some of the students have been inspired to started their own home gardens as well.

#### **New Name**

Immanuel Christian School for the Deaf is now called Immanuel Christian Integrated School due to the new Kenyan Government policy. All students – Deaf and hearing – received new uniforms and they are very happy to wear them.

## **UGANDA**

#### **Neville Muir Comprehensive School**



Thanks to very generous donations from supporters in Norway, the classrooms for the Neville Muir Comprehensive School in Lira, run by Director Dennis Dag-Kene have now started to be built! What a wonderful development! The NGO "New Start" in Norway and other Norwegian donors have provided

this initial funding of AUS45,000. There is still a need to raise the remaining AUS15,000 to complete the classrooms. These classrooms were required by the Ugandan government. The foundations and the concrete structure will be

professionally built and the students of the school (studying brick laying) will do the brick laying! With the easing of COVID restrictions, the school has about 300 deaf, disabled or poor students enrol. This is fabulous but with so many students,

classes were being held outside which was problematic on rainy or windy days. The new classrooms allow students to learn in a safe, effective and compliant way.



Foundations for new classrooms

Schools reopened and the students are back in school and vocational colleges. Four students from UNAD are learning carpentry and joinery. One student, Yubu, has been relocated and is studying at A Chance for a Child — a vocational college in Kaziba in Mityana. He is studying catering. Simon is still at RUTI studying to be a cobbler.

## **MYANMAR - MUIR SCHOOL**

Things continue to deteriorate in Myanmar but our staff and students are counting their blessings. Hardships are increasing but more Deaf people have been coming to the church where rice and oil are given to them: 72 bags of rice and 72 bottles of oil were donated by Rev. Masago and friends from the Japan Deaf Church. Our Director Pa-Lian says, "Many people have lost their jobs and when I ask them about their daily life, most of them answer that they are okay for now. It's a miracle for people with no job or income, how they are sustained every day. It is sure we are more valuable than sparrows in God's eye. We are so thankful."

Food aid was sent to 7 workers in Yangon and to the Muir School in Kalay. Schools are still closed in Myanmar including the Muir School. Security and safety are a big problem as the teachers continue to travel to the students' homes to do home tutoring. Kalay is still a battleground, with shots





being fired every day at 3pm! The students are still learning at home. Pa-Lian is preparing to go to Kalay to prepare for the next academic year. Our Deaf school will open in June if conditions are no worse than they currently are. The school has already been closed for two years.

#### F.C.L.C - LIGAO - PHILIPPINES





F.C.L.C purchased a new grass cutter and new camera from the Christmas Catalogue items. The school has started its third quarter. All teachers and staff are fully vaccinated. They are still in blended or modular distance learning. The Department of Education encourages both public and private schools to have limited face-to-face classes but F.C.L.C needs more time to prepare to be able to conduct limited face-to-face classes. Students who usually reside in the dormitory must wait a bit longer until the dormitory is allowed to be opened as commuting often will result in expensive transportation expenses.

## **DEAF BACOLOD STUDENTS - PHILIPPINES**

In January 2022, three students from the Boarding House were enrolled in Special Education (SPED)/Public School in Bacolod City for face-to-face modules. The other three students who were living at the Boarding House are continuing to study online from their homes, completing work modules. Realyn and Gerald from the Bacolod Boarding House are currently studying TLE Cookery, learning how to make a variety of sandwiches.

#### Alphonsine & Arsene - Rwanda


