It was wonderful to be able to visit our supporters in Japan again and to visit our supporting churches in Korea for the first time. The two fields are quite different. DMI Japan is mainly supported by hearing churches while DMI Korea is mainly supported by deaf churches.

In Japan I was able to speak at a number of churches, including several in Nagoya for the first time, where we gained 8 new child sponsorships as well as more prayer and service partners. The visit to Japan also gave me the opportunity to meet with the Japan Board which is in a process of change, having just taken on a new constitution and new workers and volunteers. Unfortunately, our new Head-elect Dave Taylor has had to step down because of time constraints - such a shame because he was doing a brilliant job - and ever-faithful

Alayne remains at the helm to keep DMI Japan firing. The trip to Korea was always going to be an interesting one. All our contacts there are deaf and without English, and I don't speak or sign in Korean. How far would my Auslan take me? Not far, as I found out on my first day when signing "I'm sorry my signing is poor" to shocked faces. In Korean, I was apparently signing something about having sex with a signing woman! Never used those signs again!

Taking the Gospel to the Deaf

The rest of the visit to Korea was very productive. I spoke in 3 churches (with interpreters), met a number of our pastors and missionaries and visited the Bible translation

A week with Jesus - Our future in the Middle East

The organization The Peace Dove for the Deaf in Amman, Jordan, arranged a week-long camp for the Deaf at the end of July. I was invited to preach and share about the work of DMI. The week was wonderful. Most of the participants were from Jordan, yet others came from Lebanon, Palestine and Dubai. It was a great chance to create a network for DMI and expand our work in the Middle East. At the same time, it is always a great blessing to see Deaf people longing for God's word. DMI has been active in Syria and Egypt for a long time by supporting church groups in Damascus (Syria), and Asyut and Cairo (Egypt). One of the five-year strategic goals set last year is to strengthen local congregations in Africa, Asia and the Middle East. There are many Deaf Christians in the Middle East, but most are not active due to a lack of Deaf leaders, interpreters who can give access to church services or leaders who can use sign language. That makes me think of Matthew 9:37: "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few". Becoming a Christian Deaf leader, or being one for a church, can be challenging due to the absence of Deaf role models



or learning from other like-minded leaders who can use sign language. Hence, finding ways to provide a place to be inspired, to learn from others or to have opportunities to share personal or church

challenges is essential in the higher meaning of our long-term ministry work in the Middle East. An excellent example of this has been developed in East Africa by Gunnar Dehli, who has arranged and led many Fatherheart conferences. In organizing the Fatherheart conferences, evangelists, pastors and field directors from various East African countries are invited to join. By doing this, DMI country leaders, evangelists and pastors are inspired, and our network grows with a strong focus on bringing the Gospel to the Deaf community. Pray that God will provide a clear vision for DMI to proceed in the Middle East so that Deaf Christians can get to know each other, develop, and nurture their belief. Pray that we can expand our ministry work in the Middle East. Pray that good leaders may arise. I am thankful for this opportunity offered by Peace Dove under the leadership of Sahel Ababseh.

Beni Secondary School Completed!

Over the last 6 months we've excitedly watched the progress of the Beni secondary school building project. It all began back in February with a ceremony and the laying of a foundation stone. We are thrilled to now share with you that the building project has been completed! No messing around in DR Congo!

Like any project there were a few hiccups along the way, including needing to extend the budget due to the price of materials rising dramatically. After much prayer, God provided the funds needed through generous donors and the building was able to be completed.

The new secondary school is a double story building with 10 classrooms. A new administration office was also built next to the secondary school classrooms. Many hands make light work as 34 laborers constructed the building, 14 of them Deaf. We are so grateful to all of those who donated towards

this project. Now these Deaf students will be able to complete their secondary education, making them much more employable and giving them a much brighter future.

Habari! - Matthijs visits Uganda

Deaf Action Uganda is a complex field. One of the top receivers of DMI support, its main activity is running a Bible school with nine deaf students from East Africa. It has 16 ongoing



microfinance loans, and recently established four group loans. DAU finances nine evangelists and has a support program for seven children attending school and has 12 staff workers. Its main church, Immanuel Church of the Deaf (ICD), has 250 members. In July, International Development Coordinator Matthijs visited Uganda to develop new strategies - especially the new group loan program - and encourage those in the field. He did a brilliant job of assessing the needs there. Some areas are still in the early stages of development and require more attention, yet the new group loan program is showing particular promise.

We are very close to finishing the extra classrooms at the Neville Muir Comprehensive School in Uganda. The cost to build was AUS60,000. We have raised AUS48,000. We still need another AUS12,000 to finish the job. The building has been 80% completed. Please help us finish it off! 300 students and staff will be most grateful!

Kathi's Visit to Kenya



One of DMI's biggest supporters, Professor Kathi Kitao from Japan (she's American but lives in Japan!) visited our school in Kenya (mainly) and our Uganda field (briefly) for three months from May this year. She established a library at our Integrated Christian School and insti-

tuted an extensive reading program for the students, training the teachers as well. This involved starting a Lunch Hour Reading Program which we expect will have enormous long term benefits. Kathi was told before starting the program that 'Kenya doesn't have a reading culture'. Well, that is about to change! She also taught crochet to a number of the girls ("the boys don't do that sort of thing" she was told!), some who took to it with






an uncommon passion. There are now a lot of hairdos at the school being coiffed with crocheted bandanas!

New Junior High at Kenya School

The expansion dream for our Immanuel Integrated Christian School for the Deaf to include a junior high school is being realised. The school, recently evolved into an integrated school where hearing and deaf students learn side by side, regularly achieves the highest grades of any deaf school in Kenya. Now, thanks to some generous support through Pastor Michael Gantt's (USA) fundraising efforts and Kathi Kitao's generous donation, the building of the secondary school has already started and a ground-breaking ceremony held. The Kenyan government has given their approval for the curriculum for the school and we hope to have things up and running by the start of 2023. Now, the secondary school is being built on the school's current property but it is using up land that we were using to grow crops. So soon we will have more students attending but less room to grow their food. The total quarterly cost for running the school is AUS17,000. Within that, the second biggest cost (after salaries) is food for the students and staff at AUS6,000. There is a block of land for sale adjoining the school. The cost of that land is AUS22,000. We could recover the cost of purchasing the land within a year, and then direct surplus funds to other areas of development in following years.

Originally a teacher of the Deaf, Jenny served with Neville, Lill, and Brenda in the office in Melbourne and on several service trips and at international conferences. Jenny took on an increasing workload, eventually taking on her current role, a position in which she not only kept

track of all the students in our schools - many hundreds over the years – and their sponsors, but also singlehandedly wrote the Deaf Action Newsletter each quarter.

China

We are saddened to inform you that one of our pastors in China has passed away. Unfortunately, we cannot name him for security reasons, but he was not only a pastor but one of the main leaders of our work in China. Though elderly, his passing was unexpected and so the news comes as a shock to many. Please pray for those who are grieving, especially his widow, his family and those closest to him.

The work in China is spread out across many different parts of the country – and China is a big country! Different areas seem to have different limitations as to what they are able to do when it comes to Covid restrictions. In most provinces, the Deaf are still gathering online, but this has not discouraged our workers from sharing the gospel with them. They've had online signed singing services, church services, prayer meetings, Bible studies and some have just completed 4 days of leadership training online.

New Group Loan Program Looking Good

For many years, DMI International has focused almost exclusively on expanding its ministry and service to deaf communities around the world. This has resulted in the establishment of numerous churches, schools, dormitories, camps and other forms of ministry in more than 20 countries around the world. At the same time, there has been less of an emphasis on making these ministries sustainable without ongoing financial support from DMI International. Most of DMI's ministry fields rely on monthly support from DMI for at least 90% of their income. The new group loan program is set to change this.

Money generously provided through the M&R Ediger Development Fund will enable DMI's existing ministries to develop local sources of income that will decrease their dependence on monthly support from DMI.

The group loan training workshop, held in June, was very successful. It helped participants to apply for loan applications, to understand the guidelines, practice real business life skills using the game of life, understand the DAU-MREDF Group loan approach, and develop business plans and business sustainability.

20 applicants working in 4 business groups have been approved to start in the program.

Group Loan project vs Self-Sustainability Fund project

We have two funds working to achieve self-sustainability in our fields, and they do this in two different yet complementary ways.



Group Loans

The Group Loans generously provided through the M&R Ediger Development Fund are **loans** to **individuals**. The individuals are working in small groups for support and accountability. The loans are to be repaid back to the Fund, and all profits from the business go to support the individual and their family. This provides empowerment and dignity to individual Deaf, helping them break from the cycle of poverty that is so prevalent amongst the Deaf in developing countries.

Self-Sustainability Fund

The Self-Sustainability Fund provides grants to communities. It endeavours to achieve four outcomes:

- To meet an immediate community need (eq food supply),
- Educate students (eg in agriculture)
- Provide employment (to school graduates and other local Deaf) and
- Bring in a profit for the community.

The grant does not need to be paid back to the fund. It is to be 'paid forward' within the community to develop other projects and meet other needs.
