The classrooms in Lira have been completed! Six months ago, the students at the Neville Muir Comprehensive School were studying under trees and in open fields! Now the students can study in the new classrooms. Thanks to the generosity of DMI supporters, all funding has come in and the classrooms have recently been completed.

Studies at the vocational school include Tailoring, Hairdressing, Block Laying and Concrete Practice, and Carpentry and Joinery. The school will soon be introducing Knitting, Computer studies, Motor Vehicle Technology, Agriculture and Electrical Installation and others. These courses are making a tangible difference in the lives of the Deaf and disadvantaged in Uganda. The employment rate for graduates is over 90%! We are thankful to Dennis, the Director of the school for his faithful oversight, and for the compassion and generosity shown by all our supporters. Thank you!

Ugandan National Association for the Deaf Vocational College

Five students returned from their holiday break and returned to school on time. The students closed the term with some pieces of furniture they had made for their end of term exams. It was very encouraging to see their work pieces. Sponsors should be pleased to see the students' learning producing such good results. Muir School for the Deaf



In Kalay, every night the firing between the army and people's defence force in the town is still continuing. The Muir School remains open throughout. 30 students have enrolled since June. Every morning Saw Monday and his wife lead the students and staff in their morning devotions. The teachers

continue to teach the students under such hardships. In Sep-

tember, there was a firebomb near the corner of the school but luckily there was no damage! Due to the war, materials and goods are more expensive, which has made it hard for the school. There have been fewer food donations as well. It

is always a challenge in Kalay. In 2023, the school plans to build a boys' toilet block.



KENYA

Immanuel Integrated Christian School

Since Professor Kathi Kitao's visit, the crocheting classes have continued to run and a teacher in charge guides the students through their lessons. They have been able to sew head gear/marvins for each student. Kathi was able to obtain a well-working second hand bus for the school, seating 33 people.



The next Graduation and Parent's Day will be on 21st November, 2022. The Grade 6 and Grade 8 students are also looking forward to the National Exams. More

students will enrol in the new year, doubling the size of the current enrolment! Parents are encouraged and enthusiastic about supporting the school with its infrastructure. A new laboratory classroom is in the works.

A new Parents and Teachers Association has also been established. The school is also asking for support from other organisations including the National Council of People with Disabilities and the Kenyan Government to support the students.



DR CONGO

Beni School for the Deaf

With gratitude from the Principal and DMI, Beni School for the Deaf now has a Secondary School. 25 students have graduated from Primary School from 2013 to now. Those students were studying at home because there was no Secondary School at Beni until now. In DR Congo, to get a good job, you need to have at least a Secondary School Diploma. Most students who have finished Primary School are still jobless. Beni School started building the Secondary School on 22nd February, 2022. It took six months to build. The building was completed in August, 2022. 34 workers were involved in the project, 14 Deaf included. The school is now a great asset for the Deaf community of Beni, the students and their parents and the government.



Inauguration Ceremony

On 5th September 2022, an inauguration was held for the Deaf Secondary School. This is also when the new school year started. There are 2 classes: 1st class and 2nd class. There are 18 students and 5 staff members (1 headmaster and 4 teachers). Many special guests were present at the ceremony, including political and administrative authorities. Members

of the local education board, DAC board members, parents of the Deaf, and of course the Deaf community themselves were present. It was a special day for all who participated in the inauguration. The ceremony went for two hours and included many speeches, ribbon-cutting, singing and dancing! The mayor of Beni was there to cut the ribbon. Special thanks must be given to William Edward Blackeby, who donated funds from his will to build the school. It's because of his great generosity alone and his love for the Deaf that the secondary school was able to be built. Our thanks to his

son Graham and daughter-in-law Joy who have been so very supportive throughout.

The school provides lunch once a week either on a Monday or a Friday to minimise expenses. The students eat rice, beans and cabbage or sweet potatoes for lunch. With the students' sponsorships, the school was able to buy materials for both primary and secondary school students. There are also challenges. The school is still in need of a school bus, has insufficient teaching materials and books for both Primary and Secondary school. The Secondary school also had to borrow desks, cupboards, shelves and chairs from the Primary School.

PHILIPPINES

Fishermen of Christ Learning Center, LIGAO

The school has had a great harvest season. There were 65 bags of fresh rice gathered from the small rice field. They were sun dried immediately after harvesting to avoid spoiling when storing. Deaf boys were paid to dry the rice. The avocados were also a bountiful harvest as well as other fruits and vegetables!



The school staff have been working so hard throughout the pandemic. Thanks to the generosity of a local businessman and woman, the staff were able to enjoy an overnight stay at a beach resort! Treats were also distributed amongst the

students. The staff was so grateful to be appreciated in this way.



Bacolod Boarding House

Six students continue to live at the Bacolod Boarding House and are now eagerly waiting for full time face-to-face classes to resume on 2nd November this year. The city government will distribute free school supplies to the students. These include composition notebooks, crayons, a pack of popsicle sticks, glue, a long transparent plastic envelope, writing notebooks, writing pads, a ruler, a sharpener, intermediate pads and a ballpoint pen. The students have been attending classes part time. Learning is in the form of individualised instruction that allows learners to use school materials in print or digital formats, along with other learning resources – Learner's Materials, textbooks, activity sheets, study guides, etc.

Realyn Villarin studied hard in her classes with assignments every day. She continues to learn in Grade 10 SPED classes.


