Andrew and Matthijs Visit Africa -



It was all cassava, kentes and mosquito nets as Matthijs and I visited east Africa - the first time for me to review current developments, partake in trainings, visit loan and self-sustainability projects, gather PR material, encourage staff, and preach the gospel in churches. While there were challenges to overcome, the overriding impression we received was very encouraging. Our teams there are doing a sensational job and the fruit of their work is plain to see. Supporters might be surprised to know that it was not only my first time to visit our east African fields, but it was also my first time to meet Matthijs in person! We have been working together for almost 3 years and leading DMI together for over a year, yet because of the pandemic, we had only ever met via email and Zoom! It was a pleasure to finally meet in person. Matthijs and I share a very similar work style, vision, sense of humour and passion for the Deaf. To paraphrase Psalm 133, how good and pleasant it is when leaders live and work together in unity!

Burundi

Churches

We have six churches in Burundi serving 750 Deaf. Not being there on a Sunday, we weren't able to attend any of the services, but we did get to meet our pastors and evangelists and see some of the work they are doing in schools and in the community. Fabien and the board presented to us a vision they have for the Deaf in Burundi. They plan to build, over a 5-year period, a church, Bible training centre and Christian resource centre just outside Bujumbura. This will serve as a wonderful home for the Deaf church in Burundi, as well as provide opportunities to train future evangelists and pastors, accommodate visitors and serve as an income generating facility as well. Two cars driven as taxis, which we need to help them buy, will help to finance this project.

Schools

We visited three schools for the Deaf in Burundi. The first was the Ephphatha School for the Deaf. We don't currently support this school but are connected to it through many of our board members and congregants who are graduates. The school has 10 deaf blind students - enough for one class - who need sponsorship which will help care for them and provide a teacher. We visited two campuses of the National Institute for the Deaf, schools



which our evangelists visit weekly to teach sign and to teach the gospel.

Employment

Our team in Burundi is excelling in small business support for the Deaf. Our group loans program has set up carpenters in their own joineries and helped dozens of women (and men) get a start in their own tailoring businesses. Many work together and do a stellar job. I was so impressed with their work that I bought three shirts!

Our self-sustainability community project is also getting underway. We rented five fields outside Bujumbura (for the shocking details on how we got there, see blog #44: https:// deafministriesinternational.com/44-burundi/). The rains

have come just in time, so planting commenced a couple of weeks ago with high hopes of producing bountiful crops. This project will feed Deaf families, employ Deaf workers, and bring a profit into the community.

Churches

The church in Kigali is a thriving hub for the Deaf. Matthijs and I were honoured, not only to attend the church - which was packed to the rafters - and participate in worship, but to share the gospel there as well. The famed 'long goodbye' of the Deaf community was a part of proceedings as the service closed with each of the 60 members passing the peace to each other member. Suffice to say, I can now sign 'The peace of the Lord be with you' in Rwandan sign!



Rwanda has 9 churches serving about 270 Deaf. The pastors and board members form a strong, united team. Every night one of the pastors or board members would host us and the whole team at their house for dinner. It was a rich time of fellowship, feasting and weird signing (mine).

Schools & Employment

Our Rwandan field doesn't have any schools as such but they are running a sound adult education program. On our second day, Matthijs and I led a training day for our evangelists and staff members. On the third, a seminar was held for those wanting to starting small businesses. This was run by a professional business training organisation and was attended by about 40 members. It was a functional training. Attendees formed groups which would apply for small business loans - ventures which include small restaurants, hair salons and retail outlets. We're very excited for our Rwandan field and the direction it is going.

Uganda

Churches

Our Uganda field has 20 churches for the Deaf, headed by our church in Makerere, Kampala. It was wonderful to speak to the church there and join in their worship. The highlight for me was watching Sylvia (blog #27) lead worship. That woman is gifted! The way she brings joy to the room is something everyone should experience at least once in their lifetime. The Makerere church serves 70 Deaf each week, part of the 650-strong network of Deaf believers we serve around the country. Led by Stephen Kasumba, the church is attended by many of our staff, our Bible school students and Rose, the widow of founding pastor David Bulime.

Schools

We sponsor 10 students in Uganda across several schools. Our largest educational institution is the Neville Muir Comprehensive School, led by Dennis (Blogs #25 & 26). A school for the Deaf and disadvantaged, 300 students are enrolled there, 50 of whom are deaf. We were privileged to be guests of honour at the graduation, a resplendent affair well worth



the trip, even if it did take 7 hours to get there on one of the most pot-holed roads in Africa! The ceremony was wonderful, including traditional dances, songs and speeches. Dennis was quite upset, however, that the Ugandan Catholic Church came and hijacked the ceremony making long speeches and taking two uninvited offerings. DMI, the prime supporter of the school, was sidelined. Dennis assured me that this would

never happen again. Still, we were very glad for the students and their parents who had worked so hard to graduate. Uganda also hosts our African Bible school. This is at the





heart of our mission for today and our vision for the future: training the Deaf to take the gospel to the Deaf. It was wonderful to meet Paul, the new Principal of the school, and the dozen students attending from Uganda, DR Congo and Zambia (including Emmanuel, the young Deaf man who was wrongly imprisoned for 10 years and released earlier this year - he's doing really well!). We are in the process of redeveloping our Bible School in Africa so that we can better educate and ordain more Deaf evangelists and pastors to take the gospel further across the continent.

Employment

Ugandans have been the main recipients of micro loans through our MREDF program (see September 2022 newsletter). It was rewarding to see how many of them are benefiting from the fund. We visited Winnie in her hair salon. She said she is making a good income and is hoping to expand her premises! We also stopped by the coffee shop where Sylvia was being supported by DMI during her internship. She has completed the internship and now works as manager of the cafe! What a wonderful development! I couldn't resist having a chocolate milkshake there and it was probably the best I've



ever had. I recommend it if you are in the area...

Emergency Food Distribution

As reported by several news agencies, violence between government forces and the M23 rebel group has erupted again around the Rutshuru area in DR Congo. This has had a disastrous impact on the local people and none more so than the Deaf. Many have been displaced and are without food and water. Thanks to DMI supporters, we were able to send emergency food supplies which have kept 51 Deaf families alive in circumstances where many others have, sadly, perished. Papy, our Director in DR Congo, passes on his great thanks with details of the distribution. Each person received 5 kgs of beans, 5 kgs of flour, 1lt of oil and 2 boxes of salt. It is expected that we will need to send a similar amount next month.
