The Order of Australia is presented to outstanding Australians for "meritorious, distinguished and conspicuous service" and for their significant impact at the local, national and international level. This award is, of course, a great honour for Neville and the Muir family, but it also honours the work that we support and do amongst the Deaf all around the world, and we can be proud of the role that we have played as representatives, volunteers and supporters.

KENYA - Immanuel Integrated Christian School

At the Immanuel Integrated Christian School, parents have been supportive and paying the school fees on time. It helped with the financial gap, enabling the school to continue delivering its services when inflation is high, affecting food and fuel prices. The school also stepped in to help needy Deaf students and their families by providing free uniforms, pullovers, shoes and personal items.

We would like to say a big thank you to our generous donors and supporters for purchasing the two-acre plot of land! The campaign was a success! The school was able to plough the new farmland and started planting corn and beans. They aim to harvest around 20 bags of corn which will help reduce the

costs of feeding the students. Next season they will be planting sweet potatoes and have high expectations for a good harvest as it is one of the most commonly grown crops in the region.



There have been some major challenges. More teachers and an interpreter had to be hired for the Junior Secondary School program, which has meant an increase in wages. The

other challenge has been the cost of food which has tripled, affecting even the staples – corn flour, beef, vegetables, seafood, rice and beans! Most boarding schools have been forced to close due to outbreaks of contaminated food or water but we're thankful that IICS was able to survive to the end of the term break! A Parents Day will be held in the new term which will include ball games, music and drama activities. The school will be the only school in this region to present an integrated team of students to compete against

regular schools. They believe they are a force to be reckoned with and the students will not disappoint!

D.R.CONGO

At Beni School for the Deaf, their secondary school furnishing project is going well. They have bought additional school supplies and teaching materials including maps, chairs and office equipment. They also bought desks, tables and classroom chairs for the secondary school classrooms.

Beni students were able to eat 3 school lunches a week due to a good harvest. Meals include rice and beans, cassava bread and bean sauce, cassava bread and cassava leaves, sweet potatoes and beans. Other portions of sweet potatoes are distributed to the students and teachers to take home. The students are being taught how to prepare the land for crops.

International Conference August 2023!

Registrations are now open!

Time to jump online and start registering for the 8th DMI conference. The conference will take place in Mombasa, Kenya, on August 7-11, 2023. The speaker will be Heo In Yeong from South Korea and the theme will be based on John 17:21 "That all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you".

Usually held every 3 years, due to Covid, it has been 6 years since we've gathered together for an international conference. These conferences are always such an inspiration and a blessing to those who attend, as we hear what God is doing through DMI all around the world. Everyone is invited to attend so bring a friend and come along. Both Deaf and hearing attend these conferences with each country attending providing their own interpreter. The conference will be held at the Mombasa Continental Resort which is also one of the accommodation options for the duration of the conference. The resort contains a 4-star hotel right on the water boasting beautiful ocean views, a large swimming pool, lounges, bar, recreational facilities, health club, Wi-Fi and airconditioned rooms. The other option is the Shanzu Girls Guide Hostel which is a budget accommodation option not too far from the resort. Breakfasts will be separate (by accommodation) but for lunches and dinners, we will all be together.

The program will consist of sessions with our keynote speaker, Heo In Yeong, mission reports from our fields, group activities, testimonies, time for leisure or to explore the surroundings and a day tour. The day tour will be a choice of 3 locations: Haller Park, Fort Jesus or Crocodile Farm.

There will be optional opportunities for tourism after the conference.

This conference is an opportunity for the DMI family from the fields and supporting countries to come together in one place for fellowship, fun, and to connect and build relationships.
