PHILIPPINES Ligao =

Love (and pollen) is in the air



Earlier in the year our school in Ligao, Philippines, celebrated Love Month, a Valentine's Day series of events to give students "time to socialize, develop self-confidence, show off their best and let them experience what other people feel and act during



formal gatherings". More recently, a 'Special Education Runway' was held in which a designer chose our senior students to launch his fashion line. The students looked stunning and wore the garments with great poise! Out in the field, pollen was in the air as harvests were in full swing. Rice was harvested and milled and coconuts were harvested and made into copra.

The senior students were also introduced to Livelihood Training. The training aims to train students to become entrepreneurs and create their own livelihoods in the future. Students were taught – and experienced for themselves - how they can earn a living through self-employment, creating their own businesses from scratch and being their own boss.



The students learned how to make detergents, soaps and softeners, as well as strategies for marketing the product, finding a supplier, winning customers and sustaining a feasible business in their area. Bing and Anabelle have been doing a fabulous job with this.



SYRIA

Our work in Syria is coming together again after a leadership change last year. Pastor Edward Awabdeh of the Christian Alliance Church at Damascus has a wonderful heart for the Deaf in the city and is working hard to rebuild the community there. It was encouraging to see a large group gather for Christmas and thirty Deaf now gather each week for services. Rita interprets and we have two new volunteers helping. More recently the Deaf church had a picnic for fellowship which was enjoyed by

all.

The biggest challenge the Deaf in Syria face now is economic. Just as Matthijs wrote in our last newsletter about the terrible hardships being faced by the Deaf in Egypt, the plight of the Deaf in Syria is much the same. The cost of living has dramatically increased while income and employment opportunities have not.

Pastor Edward asks that we continue in prayer for the Deaf in



Syria, especially Vera and her new-born baby who is suffering from kidney problems and multiple infections. He also offers thanks to God because things are moving ahead again in this ministry and relationships inside the group are healthy and growing.

Fatherheart School in the Middle East

We will be holding a Fatherheart school for the Deaf in Alexandria, Egypt from 1 July - 7 July. This will be the first time we have held a Fatherheart school in the Middle East. This is a big deal for us as it brings together Deaf Christians from Lebanon, Jordan, Palestine and Egypt to receive the message of how God the Father loves them. We believe this will also strengthen the Christian community among the Deaf in this region.

The Fatherheart schools give participants the opportunity to experience that we are God the Father's beloved sons and daughters in Christ. During the week, students get thorough experience and Bible teaching about God's Fatherly love for us. There is also plenty of quiet time to digest what is taught, so the love of God can be personally experienced as a reality in the heart.

We see this week as a key opportunity to continue the work among deaf Christians in the Middle East and to encourage the

leaders to persist in their valuable work.

Our Chinese sisters and brothers have been going through a really hard time but their ability to praise and rejoice amidst hardship is inspiring.



In Km*, one of the women in our church was hospiltalised with a very serious illness. Other members of the church went to the hospital to pray over her. She recovered and is back home again now, praise God. In Tj*, Hx*, Tg* and Yk* many got sick with COVID and couldn't go to church for the longest time. Restrictions

have finally lifted and they are so

happy to finally be able to meet in person in church again. They write, "praise the Lord no matter what happens we still want to worship God."

We're sad to report that Miss Lin, a hearing lady who was a

great supporter of the Deaf, passed away earlier this year. One of our leaders writes that "Miss Lin dedicated her whole life to God and to the Deaf in China. Motorbikes Help Ministry - and they're cool!

Seth, one of our evangelists in Rwanda, reports: "I reached the center at Nyabugogo at 4:30am and entered the office of Horizons [bus company] but they said I wouldn't be able to get a bus until 9:00am. I went to another company and they said I wouldn't get a bus until 2:00pm." Seth wasn't able to get to church to preach that day. This problem is not uncommon in Rwanda and other fields. Motorbikes are the solution here.

D.R.CONGO

Our workers in DR Congo continue to serve with great joy despite the great danger.

A recent mission trip to Minova was a case in point. On the road from Sake to Minova our team was ambushed by a group of M23 rebels and held at gunpoint. Much panic ensued. They asked our team for IDs which they had but all our team members were deaf and couldn't communicate further with the rebels. The rebels checked over the car and the donations of food



being carried and decided to let our team go. Praise God! They could just as easily have been robbed or killed. The team took desperately needed corn, flour, rice, beans, soap, oil and blankets to 45 displaced Deaf in Minova and 14 others in Sake. They also took something more valuable to them: the good news of Jesus. The Deaf were taught, encouraged,



challenged and equipped. Our Congelese leaders thank DMI for the financial and prayer support we give and praise our mighty God for His protection and provision.



13 employed evangelists who oversee 20 churches and fellowships around the country, encouraging and training them. This culminated in a national training conference held in mid-May, based on the theme "Rebuilding the wall" (from Nehemiah 2:5). The conference attracted over 60 participants with the leaders establishing a network



to share information, encourage one plans for future ministry.

There are a number of other minising:





- A Singles Workshop held over three sessions, preparing young men and women for marriage.
- Skin care and Cosmetology Training. Conducted by a beauty and makeup specialist, these trainings have been attended by 27 Deaf women, 1 Deaf man and 10 hearing women and encourage self-employment.

DAU continues to oversee 32 young entrepreneurs under our microloan program having already seen 6 others fully repay their loans.

Tablets & Projectors



The 30 Samsung tablets and 15 projectors that were distributed amongst our fields in Uganda, Congo and Rwanda are yielding great fruit! Deaf church members are being shown sign language videos in relation to the preaching, bringing greater clarity and interest. Since Deaf learners typically respond to visual learning plus sign language, there's great benefit to using these visual teaching materials. This is different from an evangelist only reading the Bible and explaining. Sometimes the evangelist may not be able to narrate all the details of stories, or some listening might not have the sign language skills to catch everything, but these Bible stories come



with illustrations which bring a greater understanding of the gospel to the Deaf. The stories can also be repeated several times, which is great especially for the Deaf children. They're watching them like Saturday morning cartoons!

The projectors are also being used by schools to teach sign language and show educational movies in the evening before dinner for our boarders.

Time to jump online and start registering for the 8th DMI conference. The conference will take place in Mombasa, Kenya, on August 7-11, 2023. The speaker will be Heo In Yeong from South Korea and the theme will be based on John 17:21 "That all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you".

Usually held every 3 years, due to Covid, it has been 6 years since we've gathered together for an international conference. These conferences are always such an inspiration and a blessing to those who attend, as we hear what God is doing through DMI all around the world. Everyone is invited to attend so bring a friend and come along. Both Deaf and hearing attend these conferences with each country attending providing their own interpreter.

The conference will be held at the Mombasa Continental Resort which is also one of the accommodation options for the duration of the conference. The resort contains a 4-star hotel right on the water boasting beautiful ocean views, a large swimming pool, lounges, bar, recreational facilities, health club, Wi-Fi and airconditioned rooms. The other option is the Shanzu Girls Guide Hostel which is a budget accommodation option not too far from the resort. Breakfasts will be separate (by accommodation) but for lunches and dinners, we will all be together.

The program will consist of sessions with our keynote speaker, Heo In Yeong, mission reports from our fields, group activities, testimonies, time for leisure or to explore the surroundings and a day tour. The day tour will be a choice of 3 locations: Haller Park, Fort Jesus or Crocodile Farm.

There will be optional opportunities for tourism after the conference.

This conference is an opportunity for the DMI family from the fields and supporting countries to come together in one place for fellowship, fun, and to connect and build relationships.
