



A team from the Berwick Church of Christ, headed by Chris Hennequin, visited our Bicol Deaf Action school (formerly Fishermen of Christ Learning Center) in Ligao in January. For two weeks,



fifteen men and women worked to replace the roof of the grade 7 classroom - the sole remaining building in the school with a thatch roof - with galvanised iron.

The team have done more than physical work though. They have made a significant contribution to the students' learning opportunities by providing the school with 20 laptops, iPads and a projector. They replaced 100 chairs (that really needed replacing!) with new ones and bought 100 new chickens for the farm with enough feed

for them all. They have also spent time building relationships with the staff and students - precious friendships that will last a lifetime. What a wonderful service to and with our Deaf friends in Ligao. A big thank you to the mission team members and all those at Berwick Church of Christ who have been supporting

them and Bicol Deaf Action!

Of course, the wonderful and slightly mysterious thing about all this is that the work of the mission team will not only change the lives of those at the school, it will profoundly change their own lives, too.

DAVAO - Churches —

The closing of the school in Davao last year threw the Davao Deaf church into disarray. We're pleased to announce that the ICDP church in Davao has relocated, finding a permanent (rented) home in which worshippers now meet and Pastor Glenn and his family now live. The first service of the year had 25 members. The new premises are big enough to hold 50 people.

The church wasn't able to transfer furniture and equipment from the old location so services began, undeterred, in a sparse environment with congregants sitting on the floor! Supporters in Norway, however, quickly came to the rescue providing tables, chairs and a TV to help services function well. Church members are so thankful for their new premises and furnishings and look forward keenly to services each week.



A second church for the Deaf in the Davao area is meeting in Tagum, about an hour's drive north from Davao city. Pastored by Carl Reyes, it has 9 members meeting there each week.

KENYA - School Excelling

Our school in Kenya has been integrated for 2 years now and is excelling in every area. There has been significant improvement in the academic performances among the Deaf and the hearing students. Many hearing students are becoming proficient at signing and are able to help their Deaf friends in class and their Deaf siblings at home.



Despite the financial hardships the whole country is enduring, the school has continued to deliver its core mandate in serving the Deaf and less fortunate children in the community. The result is heartwarming. The community has embraced the school like never before. Since we started this program, the school has grown to become one of the most loved and appreciated institutions in the community. Our Deaf students really appreciate the integration as they continue to make friendships and create bonds amongst their peers.

The new farm is doing extremely well. In the first season of planting, we managed to harvest 10 bags of maize which enabled us to save around KSH36,000 (US230) in food expenses. The land is fenced to keep the neighbours' animals from munching on our crops, including the maize and beans which have already been planted for the coming season. The students recently got stuck into weeding the fields and are looking forward to a bumper harvest.

Our Poultry project at the school is in good progress. A supply of 200 layers and 100 broilers has been received and they are already starting to grow nice and fat.

Our school Director Wesley notes, "The integration program has come with some challenges. We had to hire more teachers, change our school registration to an integrated school and embrace a new integrated curriculum. We have also had to complete teacher refresher courses to equip our teachers on the new developments in an integrated program. The cost of living has doubled in the last 18 months. Life is just too expensive with frequent fuel hikes. But we are not complaining. We thank God for everything.

Our school - the Immanuel Integrated Christian School - has been recognized as the top model school for providing an integrated program; a school that is giving back to society by providing quality

education that is affordable to the Deaf and vulnerable.



EGYPT Clothing Factory Update



The new clothing factory in Egypt continues to train young Deaf in textile production, provide employment, and produce quality items for sale. The first group started in November and specialised in bed sheets, producing 2,000 bed sheets! The second group has produced quality towels which they are packing as luxury gifts. These are currently on sale in stores and markets. We look forward to the sales reports in our next quarter. The third group will start

their training on February 1. At the time of writing, they are still assessing the market to decide which products for the third group to specialize in. Our ministry partner Sahel from Peace Dove is back in Cairo to oversee the operation and reports that all is going as planned. It's exciting to see this project start so well and make such a tangible difference in the lives of the Deaf in Egypt.



RWANDA

Love in Action

Late last year, heavy rain in Rwanda damaged the home of an elderly Deaf man and his daughter who is also Deaf. In a heartwarming response, some members of the ICDR-Musanze church (Rwanda), led by Florentine, one of our evangelists, visited them, baked bricks and helped to reconstruct their home. The couple were extremely grateful yet as it is more blessed to give than to receive, we're not sure who benefitted the most!

Tanzania God is on the move



Our churches and congregations in Tanzania continue to grow. We now have 27

churches and fellowships in Tanzania, ministering to a total of over 1,300 Deaf! There was great joy in our Mbeya and Ubaruku assemblies when 9 Deaf were baptised in the closing months of last year. These followed baptism classes by Pastor Umoja.

Pastor Joseph Hizza, who is the Director of DMI Tanzania, is also working to ensure that church members have every opportunity to grow in their faith, in their relationships and in the dignity of their living. He has conducted courtship trainings in 10 of our congregations. These have clearly been effective because they resulted in him officiating at the weddings of two Deaf couples, while Pastors Umoja and Buyinza officiated another!

Many in these areas have never seen Deaf weddings before. It's wonderful to see an increasing number of Deaf people forming healthy and holy relationships, but it has also increased amongst the hearing community an awareness of Deaf people and their value to society. Many testified to the truth of this, saying that it was the first time for them to not only see the wedding of a Deaf couple, but also to see a wedding officiated by Deaf pastors. Joseph says, "the preaching of the gospel in Deaf churches has seen

the Holy Spirit move, bringing 'love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness [and] faith' (Galatians 5:22) to members. We saw

this in Ubaruku. In this congregation we witnessed the harmony brought by the love of Christ, as some members who had long disagreed were able to come together and renew their friendships and unite the Church in



the process. This was earlier considered impossible." Church leaders in the Mbeya region have also been working on improving livelihoods. They have been developing a rice farm and have just had 10 bags of seeds and 40 bags of fertiliser delivered to the farm. Development of the farm includes building a shelter where workers can live and house the equipment. Planting over the 20 acres started at the end of January. We look forward to seeing a bountiful harvest!

The gospel of Jesus Christ changes lives. Many Deaf in Tanzania have experienced this change for themselves under the guidance and mentorship of experienced evangelists. We can see this through testimonies of people like Ibrahim Ndolick Guliye.

'I am ready to leave Islam and serve Christ'

Lospinsonia Consonia Without doubt, I can see that Christ is good. I was very touched by the outreach of the SUN workshop organized by DAT (Deaf Action Tanzania). I believe that one day I will be part of the Deaf Christian church when it is soon planted in Kigoma and I believe that I will even be among the founding leaders."

> I was born a Muslim and lived as a Muslim. I joined the Christian fellowship created by DAT in mid-September 2023, a week before the start of the SUN training program in the region. More than 10 Deaf Muslims also joined this fellowship.

My father died when I was 6 and my mother ran away, leaving me and my younger brother in dire poverty and hardship. We ended up being raised by our grandmother who was a Christian. The other members of our Muslim clan rejected us because of this.

I became deaf when I was a child and so I completed my primary school education at Uvinza Special Primary School where I benefited from the help of the school principal who treated me like his own child. He did this after discovering that not only was I a bright child, but I had also come from a very poor background and had been neglected by my family.

It was the principal who also ensured that I enrolled in secondary school, aided by other good Samaritans

(all Christians) who appeared and helped me until I reached form four in the mid-2010s. Since my birth, I have always been helped by Christians, starting with my grandmother, my primary and secondary school teachers, my uncle and many other strangers who sympathised with my plight. So it is not surprising that I decided to fully participate in the recent Christian gathering to learn more about Christianity. Despite the care I had been shown and the opportunities from which I had benefitted, I was not a happy man because I felt stuck between two religions. Although I preferred Christianity to Islam because of my experiences, my knowledge of Christianity was not satisfactory to make a decision. Before the DAT/SUN training I had many questions which had never been answered.

So the offer to join the discipleship training and workshop brought a change in my life. I was able to learn about creation, Jesus, the salvation of man and things like that. I came to faith. The workshop marked the beginning of my full conversion to Christianity, a decision my uncle and grandmother wholeheartedly supported.

Now I teach the good news I have learned to the Deaf children in my school. I have decided to give my life to Christ and to work at better understanding my new faith. When the Church is established in this region, I believe I will be one of the first believers to be baptized.

I would like to ask for your prayers to ensure that I will continue on the right path toward baptism and church planting.



RWANDA

More New Believers

When Senior African Advisor Sam Begumisa visited Rwanda from Uganda, he preached at the ICDR Kicukiro branch. Following a call to repentance, nine Deaf stood to start a new life of faith in Christ. Pastor Claire prayed over them, and the church is following up with support.

Four believers were baptised in Rwanda in the last quarter, three in ICDR Nyarugenge, and one in ICDR Kicukiro. These baptisms never cease to be a source of joy for all the church and across the DMI family.


Tresor's first day at school!

Tresor Nsesngiyumva is the first Deaf student we have sponsored in Rwanda. He is six years old and tiny for his age. His world changed when he started at the Umutara Deaf School last September. Born deaf, Tresor had never been to school because his parents couldn't afford it but they desperately wanted him to mix with other Deaf and learn sign language. So they brought him to the Immanuel Church of the Deaf Rwanda (ICDR) which he attends now every Sunday, walking around 3 kms to get from home to church. The church then introduced him to DMI who, thanks to generous supporters, have now provided for Tresor to attend school.

Tresor is doing well at school and started his second term in January. In the first term, he had a score of 76.6%, and is already 4th in his class! DAR Director Patrick reports that during the school holidays in December when he went to preach in the Musanze District where Tresor lives, he noticed positive changes in Tresor's behaviour and outlook. The first time he met Tresor at the Deaf Church - before he had started at school - he was not used to paying

attention to the preacher. He used to make noise and run around in church. But now he is able to focus and follow the preacher at the Deaf Church, and tries to communicate using sign language, which

was challenging for him before. We're grateful for these developments and look forward to seeing further progress in Tresor's schooling and life.



UGANDA — Muscular Christianity



Our Bible school in Uganda doesn't only produce champion evangelists and pastors but champion athletes as well. Imbuwa Mwenda, one of our students from Zambia, was recently crowned the best player of the season in Uganda. Playing for the Sun City Deaf Football Club, he won the award for top scorer with 17 goals. Recently, Sun City took out the championship with Mwenda the star player in the final. We thank God for giving Mwenda such great skill on the field and hope he has even more success from the pulpit when he graduates from the Bible school.

Fatherheart Schools Impact Deeply

In January, DMI's senior advisor Gunnar Dehli went to Kenya to help lead the Fatherheart B school with his wife Ingrid and Olav and Unni Slåtten. The 'B' school builds upon the foundations laid in the 'A' school, focusing on God's perfect parental love and transformational power. 47 people participated with 22 coming from the DMI network including leaders and evangelists from Tanzania, Uganda,


