

Christmas IN A WAR ZONE Muir School for the Deaf - Myanmar



Against all odds and working in one of the most hostile environments on earth, the Muir School for the Deaf is continuing to run as well as it possibly can. Staff and students were able to cheerfully celebrate an early Christmas with a delicious barbecue amidst the sounds and vibrations of heavy artillery in the streets outside. Kalay is still a battleground with road routes in and out of the city closed. Gunfire

continues every night in the downtown area leading some concerned parents to take their children out of school for their safety. Yet many children remain at the school - along with the brave staff - as their parents consider the school to be safer than their home.





Classes continue. The biggest challenge for the operation of the school is electric power. The government can no longer supply sufficient power and the school has to rely on solar-powered light. The current solar panel is too small and cannot give as much consistent light as they need. They plan to buy one more solar panel with kind financial support from DMI Norway.



KENYA Immanuel Integrated Christian School



Congratulations to the students and staff of the Immanuel Integrated Christian School in Kenya who have successfully transitioned up and on! The school celebrated the transition of their students from Junior Secondary to High School as well as from Primary to Junior Secondary and Kindergarten to Primary School. The Grade 8 students transitioned to High School whilst the Grade 6 students transitioned to Junior Secondary School. Both hearing and Deaf students also graduated from Kindergarten to Primary School. These are significant advancements in the lives of the students and all at the school - including parents - heartily celebrate these graduations.

Annual Parents Day was also celebrated. According to school culture, the parents get to interact with the teachers and students one-on-one to enhance good relationships with each other.



The Poultry Project is going well. They started with 200 chicks and the growth is amazing. The school farm continues to produce good corn and beans that will help to supplement their feeding program. The school farm project ensures that the students learn how to plant, grow, and care for the plants which give them food

at the end of every season. It creates responsibility, career development and social-economic uplift for the students. Students continue to grow their knowledge in Permaculture Farming and in a variety of plant



a variety of plant/animal care.



IICS received new whiteboards from a generous supporter. The community at IICS continues to receive compliments for its successful integration program. The government continues to take a keen interest in its success in operations and management.

BURUNDI Ephphatha School for the Deaf



14 DeafBlind students continue their studies at school. A SIL team from America and Colombia conducted two training workshops. SIL is a global, faithbased nonprofit

organisation that works with local communities to develop language solutions that expand possibilities for a better life of individuals. 14 DeafBlind students participated in one workshop along with 14 Deaf student guides, 9 school staff and

5 parents. After the workshop was completed, SIL organised quality eye exams for the 14 DeafBlind students. Deaf Action Burundi plans to hold Burundi Sign Language classes in several places for family members of DeafBlind students.



UGANDA Ugandan National Association for the Deaf Vocational College



Brian, Jordan, Kenneth and Samuel have completed their final DIT assessments in carpentry. They will be waiting for their results in March when we will know of their graduation plans as well. They will be receiving tools from DMI after their results come through so they can start their own carpentry businesses.

Tresor continues to do well in his preschool classes. In the first term, he had a 76.6% score in his studies and he is in the 4th position in his class. He is excelling well in Maths and Kinyarwanda (National Rwanda Language). Bicol Deaf Action (Formerly Fishermen of Christ Learning Center)



Fifteen men and women from the Berwick Church of Christ completed a 2 week mission trip to BDA in January. Led by Chris Hennequin, the team worked to replace the roof of the Grade 7 classroom - the sole remaining building in the school with a thatch roof - with galvanised iron. They also provided the school with 20 laptops, iPads and a projector. They replaced 100 chairs (that really needed replacing!) with new ones and bought 100 new chickens for the farm with enough

DR CONGO Beni School



DMI UK supporters raised funds to give the Beni students gifts for Christmas. These included biscuits, sweets, juice boxes and balloons. The students were also given new school uniforms and school bags which they were very thankful for and excited to receive.





Beni School would like to say a big thank you to supporters for gifting them a new 3 wheeled motorbike. It will greatly assist the school in transporting the harvest from across three fields. It was on our 2024 project wish list and we are grateful to achieve this wish!

A new toilet block of five toilets was erected for the secondary school. Before these were built there was a severe shortage of toilets so having these installed brought great relief! Construction of the five toilets (one for the teachers, two for the girl students and two for the boy students) involved eleven workers, six of whom were Deaf. The team at Deaf Action Congo wish to express their thanks to DMI for having responded to this major request.



Staff suspended agricultural activities in the school garden from November because of the dry season. The harsh conditions of the dry season have a dire effect on garden production and finding water is difficult due to distance. The best solution would be a drilling fountain at the school, but the drilling fountain is costly, at around AUD10,000 ~ AUD15,000.

Food has been provided three times weekly. In October, students were eating sweet potatoes and beans from their harvest. In November, it was rice and beans.

LIGAO TEACHERS' EDUCATION FUND CAMPAIGN

Teachers at FCLC are receiving much less pay than the local government school rates. FCLC is lucky to have these teachers who are willing to stay on to teach Deaf students when they could be receiving more money from other schools. These teachers really have a great heart to serve. We are looking to change this, by better supporting our teachers through a salary increase.
