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TANZANIA Ministry going from strength to strength

Deaf Action Tanzania (DAT) is one of our strongest fields. Led by Joseph Hiza, our 13 churches, 12 fellowships and numerous education and employment projects are doing exceedingly well. In the first quarter of the year, 57 Deaf joined our congregations across the country and accepted Christ as their saviour. Of those, 18 were baptised in Lake Victoria in May. The others will be baptised in the next quarter after completing baptism training. The new believers have already taken on evangelical roles and are serving to strengthen the faith of young and old believers alike.

Leadership training across our fields in Tanzania has enhanced the spiritual lives of our evangelists and leaders and created a positive

environment, instilling vision, hope and faith and fostering a sense of connectedness amongst our congregations in Ifakara, Morogoro, Ubaruku and Mbeya.

In Kigoma and Ifakara, evangelists were sent on a three-month outreach mission to communities reaching 15 Deaf family members, 19 Deaf friends and 7 previously unconnected Deaf gatherings. Our Mbeya and Ubaruku churches did the same under the guidance of Pastor Maduga. The programs also helped to raise awareness of the Deaf and Deaf churches in the hearing communities and succeeded in promoting positive attitudes towards the Deaf.

18 boys baptised!



Ben and Veronica Buyinza are gifted evangelists who continue to lead many Deaf to Christ. Working in the northern lakes area of Tanzania, they pastor two churches and several school fellowships. Last month they baptised 18 youths from a fellowship led by Veronica at the Bwiru Boys' Secondary School. Seemingly unconcerned by the herds of hippos and crocodiles swimming about, the boys were baptised in Lake Victoria and all lived to share their testimony of it. We rejoice in these in these new lives, saved through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. In a world where many choose to take the broad road that leads to destruction, it's encouraging to see these young men make a decision to walk the narrow path that leads to life. We celebrate their baptism, and we pray for their growth to maturity in faith.



PHILIPPINES Davao Churches

Pastors and evangelists continue to guietly and faithfully work their fields across the Philippines. Pastor Carl Rigel Reyes works as a preacher and facilitator at the Davao Immanuel Church of the Deaf. He also goes to Tagum Christian Fellowship every Sunday morning and afternoon to teach Sunday School. Pastor Glenn Yray works with him as a preacher and facilitator for the Sunday School and leads church worship in the Deaf Community. If Carl is sick or absent, Pastor Glenn will be the one to go to Tagum instead. Last February, the church celebrated Valentine's Day to show and share love to each member so that Valentine's Day would not be only for lovers, but also for congregants to show a fresh love and kindness to their parents, sisters, brothers, friends and to everyone they know. This is how Valentine's Day is celebrated every year in the church. Pastor Albert, head of IDEAP (Immanuel Deaf Evangelists Association, Philippines) continues to ask for prayer for revival in the Deaf churches across the Philippines.



Zamboanguita Projects

Numerous self-sustainability projects are providing for pastors and their ministries across Negros Island. Pastor Rodel Manila, a DeafBlind man, and his wife Dina continue to manage the chicken layer project in Zamboanguita and grow vegetables in their yard for food. Raymart Santerva continues to sell his quail eggs in Dumaguete. The mushroom production project continues to produce and 2 restaurants have signed up to buy them! We are experimenting with additional mushroom varieties like pink oyster and shiitake mushrooms.

Likewise, our Tanzanian churches commemorated the day by holding special worship services. The women wore traditional clothes and received gifts from the church.

In Uganda, too, it was women who led the service carrying the theme of thankfulness as women who fear God. Women encouraged other women to always be faithful to their husbands. Many marriages had gone bad because of the unfaithfulness of wives so women were urged to be true in all ways of life, even in dressing modestly. Women, as the backbone of the family, were exhorted to live honourable lives and were praised for doing so.

Although far from perfect vision, he now has much more confidence in getting around, and is finding reading much easier. So the process was well worthwhile. I can sign to him from a greater distance and he is much more aware of his surroundings.

As for your generous donations, we have tracked expenses very closely and were able to not only pay for all surgical and eyeglass expenses, but also to bring up to date his government benefits (SSS, "Pag-ibig" and Philhealth) and we have enough left to pay these benefits for another year or two. BURUNDI Farm Project brings self-sustainability

Over the last three years, we have provided six community grants across our ministry network for the purpose of increasing self sustainability in our fields. (These are in addition to the dozens of micro loan projects which individuals have started.) The objectives of the community grants are four-fold: to meet a community need, to educate young Deaf, to provide employment for the Deaf, and to bring an income into the Deaf community. Not all projects are expected to achieve all four objectives.

We've been encouraged with the success some fields have had with these projects. In DR Congo, for example, the farming project has provided school lunches for the last three years despite tremendous hardships. Others have not succeeded, like our farming project in Malawi which, despite having a good start, was completely wiped out by typhoon Freddie last year. Other projects have had mixed results. Some leniency is warranted here. According to Lawpath, "60% of businesses in Australia will fail within their first three years of operation, with 20% of businesses failing in their first year of operating." This is supposedly with highly educated people and a secure economy. We are partnering with people with a disability who have limited business education and are working in environments where theft, corruption and warfare are common. The challenges are huge but it's worth persevering to see as many as possible achieve a good measure of





self-sustainability.

In November 2022 we started a new community farming project in Burundi. We're pleased to see this continue to do well. The most recent report shows sales of corn to be strong, bringing in a good profit for the quarter. We look forward to seeing this project develop further in the coming quarters. DR CONGO Baby dedications

It was wonderful to see two Deaf couples bring their children to be dedicated to the Lord during the Easter day service at the Goma Deaf church on March 31. Papy, our director in DRC and pastor of the church dedicated the baby boys - both named Michael! Michael Kazingfu is the son of DAC Chairman Stanislas and his wife Ruffine. Michael Kitoko is the son of church members Guy and Irene. (Papy married these two couples in the same church!) More than 150 people attended the service to celebrate the Easter miracle and the dedication of the two boys.

At a time when there is so much civil unrest and instability across the country, it's encouraging to see couples declaring their faith and committing their families to



Christ. We rejoice with them and look forward to seeing these little boys grow big, healthy and strong and be a blessing to their communities.



EGYPT — Learning how to live

Our mission partners in Egypt continue to provide Sunday school classes for Deaf children aged 3 to 14. Bible stories are taught in an easy and simple way, which has led to noticeable behavioural improvements. Stories in the last quarter include Jacob, Joseph, Jonah and John the Baptist. Each story teaches that trials are permitted by God and that God does not abandon His children and this lesson has had a deep impact on the Deaf Christian children who often find themselves ostracised in a Muslim country.

Meetings typically begin with prayer, before the children sing hymns, then hear a review of last week's story and the introduction to this week's story. Their time together finishes with games, colouring and drawing. The kids love it! Mission leader Sahel holds regular online training meetings with the Sunday School leaders to help them prepare and run classes.

One mother of three children who are in Sunday school - two Deaf and one hearing - tells us that when meetings started, her children





found it difficult to sit in. They lacked concentration and interest. If she was ever unable to attend with them they were terribly sad. Now during Sunday school meetings, however, their concentration has improved and their interest has risen. After hearing a story, the children are excited to explain it after returning home. She's so pleased to see her children flourish in this way.

RWANDA God's Hands



In our February newsletter this year we told the heartwarming story of how the members of our church in Rwanda (DAMR) baked bricks and rebuilt the house of an old Deaf man and his Deaf daughter. The house had been destroyed by heavy rains and the family had nowhere to live. The actions of the church are a fine example of practical Christian love.

But there is more to this story. On the second day of building, Patrick, the DAMR Director, joined them. While he helped the Deaf church members bake bricks, he heard the life story of the old Deaf man and his daughter. Their story deeply touched his heart, making him realise that they truly needed DMI's support. Over the next few days, Patrick started raising money to buy doors for the house of this vulnerable Deaf family. He successfully raised FRW 240,000 (AUD280) and DAMR promptly sent the funds to the old man and his daughter so they could purchase doors for their house. They were truly grateful for this support. God's Mouth

Every quarter DAMR holds a meeting for all the ICDR (Immanuel Church of the Deaf Rwanda) evangelists, pastors and committee members. At the meeting, everyone is encouraged to present a report in front of the other attendees. They share the positive outcomes and achievements that have occurred at the ICDR Branches they represent. This allows everyone to learn from each other. Reports are typically inspiring and serve to strengthen the other members. During the meetings, the Chairman, Executive Director, or other experienced people train the ICDR leaders on topics such as evangelism and church leadership. This helps them stay focused and passionate for evangelical work, and reminds them of their divine calling (Matthew 28:19), of the promise of Jesus to be with them always, even to the end of the age (Matthew 28:20), and of the guidance of the Holy Spirit (John 14:26). The meetings give the team opportunity to pray together and share a meal with each other.



God's Word

There is a real need in Rwanda for more Bibles. English Bibles are received from time to time and they are well used but the real need is for Kinyarwanda Bibles. Patrick has been requesting 30 Kinyarwanda Bibles for over a year now but we have never had the funding for it. 30 Kinyarwanda Bibles will cost AUD700 (\$23 each). We have approached various Bible societies for help with this but they always refer us to the Bible Society in Rwanda which then gives us this price!
