



Grants Change Lives!

Since our last newsletter we have been blessed with three grants which will bring tremendous improvement to the lives of the Deaf across our fields.

1. Housing loan fund

The cost of living has skyrocketed all over the world and nowhere more so than in developing countries. These hardships have impacted the Deaf more than others, forcing them into poor and sometimes dangerous housing conditions. This applies to our field directors as well who have families and have taken on the enormous job of overseeing our operations in their respective countries. Their wages are low even by local standards. To help them escape the rent trap, we have received a grant which enables us to provide interest free housing loans to our directors. So instead of paying rent, they can now buy their own house and pay it off in under 10 years. And so a whole life trajectory changes for the better. As loans are repaid, others in our fields can benefit in the same way. Four housing loans have been approved so far.



2. School loan fund

The teachers and staff at our school in Kenya live from paycheck to paycheck which creates a serious problem when there is a

medical or personal emergency. In response to this, a generous donor has provided a grant to be used as a school loan fund. It is hoped that the success of this program will lead to loan funds being extended to other schools in DMI's network.



3. Water fountain grant

An Australian foundation has provided DMI/DA with a AUD48,000 grant to install water fountains in and around our school in Beni, DR Congo. 12,000 people (300 Deaf and 11,700 hearing) living in and around the city of Beni will benefit from this grant. Because of war, thousands of people have been displaced, worsening the crisis of a lack of clean water in the city. People living in and around our school currently have to travel up to 10 kms (by foot or by bicycle) to the nearest well. Construction of one well/fountain producing water to 10 hydrants throughout the local community each with 5 taps can provide clean water for 3,000 families daily. One of the hydrants would be within our school grounds, the other 9 would be spread throughout the community and operating under the authority of local chiefs. *(See breaking news on page 5)*

Responsibly executed, grants change lives. If you are connected to a foundation or trust, please consider providing a grant for the work that DMI and DA are doing. Similarly, bequests left to DMI can bring lasting change. Many needs remain in our fields. The Deaf are amongst the most vulnerable people in the world, and DMI is amongst the most responsible in managing support.

The three new Grade 7 students' parents took them to the school to enrol them. The students attended the opening of classes and attended school.

While the teachers were absent from the classrooms, the students got busy cleaning the school and making the grounds look wonderful. The principal, Alain, was able to purchase new school sup-

plies for the students. They were grateful to Deaf Child Hope and DMI for providing those necessary supplies including exercise books.

In June, Deaf Action sent \$1,000 to help with the food emergency unfolding in Bulengo, DR Congo. DAC Director Papy organised the distribution of much-needed food relief to 40 Deaf families. Supplies distributed included rice, corn flour, beans, sugar, oil, salt and washing detergent. Thank you to all our supporters who gave so generously to this campaign.



BREAKING NEWS! Fountain drilling begins

October 30 was a special day for Beni School for the Deaf. They held a special launch ceremony for the drilling of the new water fountain. The launch ceremony started at 9.30 am and finished at 11 am. There were guests in attendance including Pastor Papy from Goma, political and administrative authorities from





the Beni municipality including some representatives from the Butembo and Oicha areas, Deaf churches, parent representatives, students and teachers and the working team. The launch ceremony opened in prayer and with the singing of a National hymn, followed by speeches, then

the launching ceremony at the drilling vehicle itself. The ceremony was fantastic and everyone was pleased to see this project start to meet the dire need for accessible clean water in Beni. Thank you to DMI supporters for making this happen! More updates to come.
