


Garden Church mission team with BDA staff

Many Deaf have not received sex education so can be abused in relationships and in the work place. Some Deaf work in massage parlours where they can be taken advantage of by customers and employers. The workshop has given them an understanding of human relationships, boundaries and godly sexuality.



The church was also invited to a cinema to see a movie called 'Mumu' about the life of Deaf and CODA people. They were so touched and thankful to be given the opportunity to join in an activity like this together. For many, it was the first time to watch a movie in a cinema!



Miss J stayed in 'Y' city for three months teaching in the church and encouraging other non-Christian Deaf in their workplaces about God in God's gentle way. She also led the church in celebrating its 19th anniversary using lots of dramas which everyone enjoyed so much. KENYA



Baby dedications

What a joy to see 14 new Deaf believers baptised in our Kenyan churches! On his visit to the coastal regions, Josephat not only baptised the new disciples but dedicated 9 babies as well. These faith commitments reflect a building momentum across our Kenyan fields, improving the welfare of the Deaf spiritually, relationally and

vocationally. It's reported that the ICD congregations are doing well and continue to spread the gospel amongst the Deaf.

Land has recently been surveyed in a step toward DAK (Deaf Action Kenya) constructing our first church building for the Deaf in Kenya.

The MREDF small group micro-loans will finally be starting in Kenya. The Deaf there have been crying out for years for these loans to be made available to them. The painfully slow banking system in Kenya has delayed our start but we are now ready to provide the loans. These will provide business opportunities which will



bring a much needed economic boost for many of our evangelists and church members.

An additional boost to our operations in Kenya comes with the full-time employment of Anne Kounda as DAK Office Manager. Anne is a dynamo and a welcome inclusion as Josephat moves further into pastoral work in the churches, Fatherheart schools and other areas of ministry.

DAK pastors and evangelists have expressed the need for a youth camp. They fondly remember the days when they held these, meeting with fellow brothers and sisters in fellowship. We will be working with DAK to see these camps running once again.

BURUNDI

Sewing workshops going global?

Deaf Action Burundi has five sewing workshops which produce superb items of clothing while supporting dozens of Deaf ladies and their families. The workshops also generate an income for local Deaf communities. We're looking at turning

this local business into a global enterprise.

We have the artisans in Burundi, we have acquired the services of a well-known fashion designer in Australia, and we have the support of a businessman who is keen to help us manage this expanding market. The



tricky thing at this point is the transport and distribution of goods from Burundi to outlets (online as well as brick and mortar) around the world.

We are talking to logistics companies now but if anyone has expertise in this field we would love to hear from you.

UGANDAStudents excelling

Students and staff at the Neville Muir Comprehensive School are celebrating excellent exam results from last year which have just come out. Our students performed the



best among many students from regional schools who sat the same examination papers. All of our students passed

with flying colours! Our current students, after hearing about the results, were so happy they began thanking the teachers for their hard work on behalf of those students who graduated last year! They also expressed thanks to DMI for its financial support and encouragement. The city authorities delivering the exam results also spoke uplift-

ing words to the current students and encouraged them to work hard and perform even better this year. The School has just begun its second



term of the year with 121 students, 53 of those being Deaf, and 68 disabled or vulnerable.

Thanks to a generous donation from DMI Norway, the school is building a house for school director Dennis. (He had earlier given away his house to the school for its use.) There is a lot of excitement around the construction. The students are working together with the engineers and professional builders to help build Dennis's house. This explains why it's being constructed so quickly!

The students have been busy with other endeavours outside the classroom as well. They have been planting maize and sweet potatoes for their own consumption next term and express gratitude to DMI supporters for looking after their well-being and health as well as their studies.

Back in the classroom, they have been working hard on their general subjects and their electives. General subjects include English, ICT, CRE and sign language. The sign language classes ensure that the hearing students are able to communicate well with those who are Deaf.

In their elective subjects the students train in design, hairdressing, carpentry, and construction. The ongoing challenge is the lack of tools and materials to practice with. The mannequins, the girls are using to train in hairdressing also so old and used that there really isn't much hair left on them to practice with! ZAMBIAZambia rising again

It's been a challenging season for our brothers and sisters in Zambia. A change in leadership, while absolutely necessary, has been challenging. Pruning can be painful! Yet the new team under board Chairman Mambwe and new

Director Bywell have been making wonderful inroads. Our new organization, DAMZ (Deaf Action Ministries Zambia) is now registered and functioning well. Authorization to visit the Deaf in prison has been granted. Two Zambian students have gone to the Bible school in Uganda without any problems. And Janet's sponsorship has resumed and she is doing superbly at school. We are still trying to locate Maliza. We rejoice in these new developments and pray for our new team there that they will continue to fulfill DMI's mission in Zambia to take the gospel, education and employment to the Deaf all over the country.



RWANDA ADBC



Development of our African Deaf Bible College is progressing nicely. We are on schedule to complete construction by the end of September. It's exciting to physically see the College take shape. We are also working hard behind the scenes to ensure that operations will be ready by the College opening which has been scheduled for January 24, 2026.

The College Principal has now been hired and we are currently interviewing for the Dean of academic

affairs as well as other teaching and auxiliary staff positions.

We are truly grateful to some very generous donors who have committed to

cover operating costs for the first few years of the College (amounting to approximately AUD50,000 per year). Fundraising is now focused on scholarships to enable as many Deaf and signing people as possible to study at the college. DMI supporters would be most welcome to provide



US700 (DMI students) or US1800 (non-DMI students) annual scholarships for students to study at the College.

This College is at the heart of DMI's mission. With the capacity to educate up to 350 Deaf and signing people in certificate diploma and degree courses, the College is paramount to gospel expansion amongst the Deaf throughout the African continent. DR CONGO

Beni School Security wall finished!



We are pleased to announce that the security wall at our school in Beni, DR Congo, has finally been completed. This has come to fruition after many years of need, thanks to the generous gifts of DMI supporters in Australia and Japan. With the deteriorating circumstances in DRC, the security wall was becoming an ever-greater necessity to protect our students against the overflow of war. The wall was completed on July 26, and the ceremony to mark the completion of the wall will be held on September 1. We are truly grateful to those who made it happen, and the staff and students at the Beni school send their most profound thanks and heart-felt love.







Carpentry Workshop

At the request of DAC (Deaf Action Congo) director Papy, DMI was able to fund a carpentry workshop for unemployed Deaf men in DR Congo. Unlike recipients of the small group loan fund, these seven men will work in the carpentry workshop effectively as employees of DAC, which will oversee the program. So the men have no loan to repay, and can earn a living while ideally helping to generate extra income for the Deaf community as well.

This is a lifesaver for a people whose lives have been upended by war and loss. The carpentry initiative will not only equip them with valuable skills but also enable them to contribute meaningfully to their families and society. Financial transparency is a key aspect of the project along with demonstrating the project's sustainability. We are aiming for this to become self-sustainable within its first year of operations.

Australian Members needed

It has also come to the board's attention that we need to have more DMI members. To be clear, members are not directors and do not sit on the board (which can be confusing because we also refer to directors as 'board members'!). Members are in a wonderful position - they are important but they don't actually have much to do. Members have the right to attend the AGM, may attend remotely, and their vote is required for some key things under the Corporations Act – such as any amendment to the constitution - and they do have an important role in the appointment of directors, and in making sure that directors operate in accordance with the organisation's mission and vision.

NORWAYFatherheart school held in Norway



The Fatherheart school held for three weeks in Norway in June-July had a powerful impact on participants. The testimonies on the last day confirmed this with the 44 attendees from 9 different countries experiencing spiritual growth, receiving new insights and receiving healing in their hearts. DMI Senior Advisor Gunnar said that he had never seen a stronger fellowship develop between Deaf and hearing people than what he witnessed at this gathering.

DAU (Deaf Action Uganda) field director Tonny and DAK (Deaf Action Kenya) field director Josephat were key leaders in the school and were themselves strongly affected by the gathering. "Through Fatherheart Ministries, I received deep comfort from the Father. I've been facing many personal challenges, pressure, and pain in my life. But during the times of fellowship and prayer, I felt the Father's healing love touching my heart," Josephat said.



Tonny's experience was similar. "Coming into the conference I had so many challenges. I felt like I had been under constant attack, but at the conference, inside my head was full of joy and happiness. I was like a baby receiving milk from its mother. I experienced so much cheer in my heart. I give all the glory to God for how far he has brought me." Josephat will be travelling with his wife Claire to Ethiopia and the Ivory Coast for Fatherheart schools in August and September. Matthijs will join them as second speaker at the conference in Ethiopia. Ruth Njihia or Sam Begumisa will likely join them on the Ivory Coast. The Fatherhood schools continue to make a profound difference in the lives of the Deaf as they learn about and experience the love of their Father God.
