Bicol Deaf Action recently held its 42nd Graduation Day, and we couldn't be prouder! Eight Deaf students graduated from Grade 12.

These students worked incredibly hard to reach this milestone. We also celebrated the achievements of nine Grade 10 students, three Grade 6 students, and two Kindergarteners. The school is now enjoying a well-deserved break before the new school year begins on 8th June 2026.

Bicol Farm

We are thrilled to share that the farm quarters are officially complete! Now totally renovated and with a fresh coat of paint, our farm houses are now a decent place to call home, all thanks to the generous supporters of Deaf Action and the Garden Church in Los Angeles.

The farm fence is also finished, and our agricultural projects are thriving. We continue to plant more coconuts and vegetables, and our chilli plants are finally bearing fruit. This is a wonderful sign, as we prepare to launch our chilli garlic oil production—a new step toward our goal of self-sustainability.

To help manage the limited water supply during the hot season, we have installed a new water pump. Since water often only becomes available late in the evening, the pump allows us to store what we need. We have also laid down new water pipes near the crops, which will save our workers a great deal of time and energy when watering the plants.

Immanuel Integrated Christian School (IICS)

Immanuel Integrated Christian School (IICS) has had a wonderful start to the year! The academic year was officially launched with an opening ceremony involving both students and staff. We are pleased to report that student attendance rates have improved compared to previous terms.



There has been a noticeable improvement in literacy and numeracy across the lower year levels. To support our diverse learners, IICS introduced differentiated instruction strategies, alongside an increased use of teaching aids and technology. The successful implementation of structured lesson plans across all grades has led to measurable growth in student comprehension, problem-solving, and

active participation. Continuous assessment results show steady progress, particularly in reading fluency and basic mathematics, as students become more confident and independent in their work.

To foster a love of books, IICS has promoted a vibrant reading culture through daily scheduled reading times, classroom reading corners, and full library access for all students. Reading competitions and storytelling sessions have been built on the foundation of the extended reading program that was introduced and nurtured by DMI supporter Kathi Kitao.

These initiatives, along with our Literacy Week celebrations, have greatly contributed to improved reading fluency and comprehension. During mid-term assessments, we were also proud to identify and award our top-performing students.

Throughout the quarter, we held Parent-Teacher meetings to strengthen the collaboration between home and school.



Our school farming project has also flourished! The expansion of the farm yielded an increase in produce, including bananas and poultry. We celebrated an Environmental Awareness Day to focus on sustainability, and our farm continues to cultivate maize, beans, and leafy greens. Students have been hands-on with planting, weeding, and harvesting, and

this fresh produce now supports our school feeding programs. Agriculture has also been beautifully integrated into the school curriculum.

The students' talents truly shone during a showcase performance featuring music, drama, and the creative arts. They also continue to enjoy co-curricular activities, including various sports and clubs. Through Scouts camping, students are developing vital life skills and vocational training, while our cooking and sign language classes continue to enhance our inclusive education practices.

Our teachers have been hard at work as well, completing professional development sessions conducted by the Ministry of Education at the district level. Through collaborative planning and effective classroom management, they remain committed to delivering high-quality lessons and providing continuous feedback to our students.

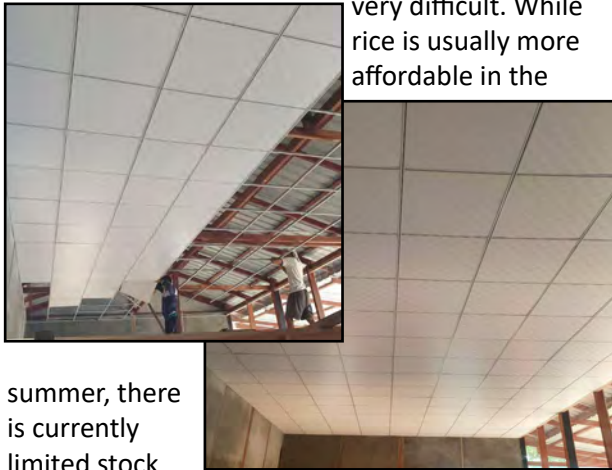
MYANMAR

The academic year has officially finished for the students at Muir School for the Deaf. The students are now enjoying their long summer holidays, which will continue until the last week of May.



The school has successfully completed the installation of new insulated ceilings, which will be vital for keeping out both the summer heat and the monsoonal rains. However, our main concern remains the food supply. Because many local farms were unable to harvest, conditions have remained

very difficult. While rice is usually more affordable in the



summer, there is currently limited stock

to purchase in advance, and prices are expected to rise much higher once the rainy season begins. Kalay remains quite isolated; travel is difficult for the community as high costs and the lack of bus services mean people are unable to travel in or out of town. We were, however, thrilled that school teacher Saw Monday was able to join Myanmar director Pa Lian and Yangon church Pastor Naing Naing Kyow at DMI's 9th International Conference in Cebu earlier this month. Our thanks to the supporter who enabled this. Saw Monday was so happy to be at the conference and benefited from the teaching and fellowship.

IICS middle school building is falling into terrible disrepair and desperately needs renovation. Initially built as the first stage of construction for a middle school and high school (to be built above the middle school classrooms), a proper roof was never put in place. As a result rain has made holes in the ceiling and is damaging the classrooms at an alarming rate.

We need USD\$60,000 to repair the damage and construct the high school classrooms above. This will not only finish the building but enable us to complete the school as a K-12 educational institution, maintaining the highest standard of education that our students are receiving right through to the end of their secondary schooling.

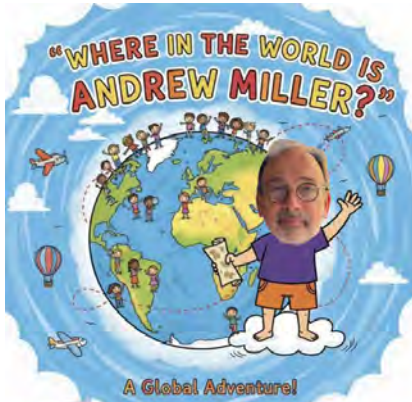
Weddings in Ligao

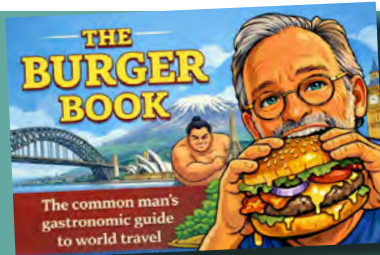

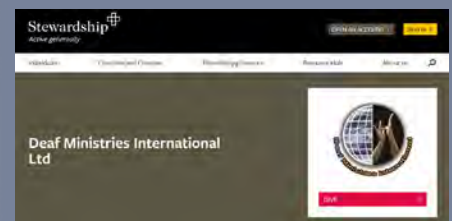
